Dr. Kiang recently has been in the limelight in Canada and the United States for his criticism of Pearl Buck's "The Good Earth."

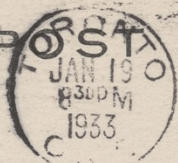

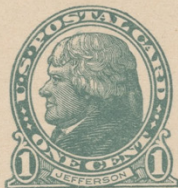

Dr. Kiang Uses New Scientific Devices



Speaking to the weekly luncheon meeting of the Advertising Club of Montreal recently on "China Today" with special reference to advertising practices, old and new, Dr. Kiang Kang-Hu, Professor of Chinese Studies at McGill University, used a number of newly developed scientific devices, loaned by the Research Products Department of the Northern Electric Company, Limited.

The inside photographs shown here were taken by the new photographic flash lamp which leaves no smoke or odour and is therefore permitted for use in even the finest surroundings. And in order that the speaker's voice might be easily audible without undue strain, a special small lapel type microphone recently developed in the Bell Telephone Laboratories was provided for his use in conjunction with the Public Address System (voice amplifiers). This microphone has been specially developed for use by lecturers who from the nature of their address are obliged to turn away from their audience and point to a blackboard or map and would, therefore, not be facing the ordinary microphone.

The Northern Electric Company will demonstrate a new public address system at this meeting. On the lapel of the speaker's coat, as shown in the illustration, will appear a very small microphone which will amplify the speaker's voice no matter how much he moves about the room. The device is connected with its amplifier by a pair of flexible wires. The speaker trails these with him as he moves around. In developing this system for the Northern Electric Company, the Bell Telephone Laboratories had to cut down the rumble of sounds coming from the breast. They provided an electric filter which produces the proper balance between these sounds and the voice. Sergius P. Grace, a well-known international lecturer on the marvels of the telephone, has frequently mystified his audience by using this microphone, and while he will not attend our meeting, Prof. Kiang Kang-Hu will wear the apparatus.

Intelligence Test

Prof. W. D. Tait, Faculty of Arts, Department of Psychology, McGill University, will give to any member of the Advertising Club of Montreal or to any member of the Adclub Study Group or their friends, an Intelligence Test on the evening of December 2nd at 7.30 p.m., in the Bell Telephone Company Assembly Hall, in the Beaver Hall Hill Building prior to his lecture, which on that evening will not open until 8.00 p.m. The charge for such a test individually taken would be \$5.00. On this particular night Prof. Tait is offering the test for \$1.00. The test forms will be handed out to each participant upon the payment of the \$1.00 fee. They will then be returned to Prof. Tait for examination and rating. The result will not be disclosed except to the individual confidentially.

The value of the test will depend upon the faithfulness with which the directions are followed out and should be of considerable value to those taking it. The tests are thoroughly scientific and are based on careful research.

Remember that any member can have the test for members of his or her family at the same time and at the same rate of \$1.00 per person. In the case of firms, you may bring your whole department if you wish.

Book Review

Modern Brush Lettering, by Harold Holland Day. Published by the Signs of the Times Publishing Company, Cincinnati. 35 alphabets; 88 pages; 10 $\frac{3}{4}$ x 8 $\frac{1}{4}$ inches in size; \$3.

This book is designed to supply a variety of letters, rendered by hand, that will harmonize with type faces. The author has selected a number of type faces as guides, although they have not been duplicated exactly.

In his foreword Mr. Day states the aim of the book as an effort "to turn away from the usual meaningless excrescences rampant in formative periods of lettering." He goes on to say, "An understanding of basic design will serve to check the natural consequences of over-zealous originality."

The letters chosen were selected because the designs lent themselves to brush use and encouraged freedom

of style, which may be the reason for the inclusion of a number of grotesque letters. The type faces upon which the alphabets are based include Frederic C. Goudy's Forum letter, Garamond, a Caslon influenced Roman, Futura, Kabel, Neuland, Stellar, Bifur, Cooper Bold.

Several pages in the back of the book show reproductions of printed pieces in which hand lettering has been utilized.
