

Balfour Declaration, the Palestinian Resistance Movement and future options

On November 2nd, 1917 Britain Secretary of state for foreign affairs, Mr. M.J. Balfour, addressed letter to Baron Rothschild declaring the support of the British government for the establishment of "Jewish national home" in Palestine. The Palestinian Arabs, the overwhelming majority of the population (93%) were not notified, much less consulted, about the promise when it was made. They first came to know about it, second-hand, in 1919.

The Balfour declaration, which was followed by British mandate over Palestine and increasing Zionist immigration, was the beginning of a Zionist-British imperialist alliance that culminated in 1948 with the scramble and occupation of Palestine. The Palestinians were uprooted, displaced and denied the most elementary right for self-determination. They lived outside Israel as refugees and their return to their homes was prevented by the Israeli government.

In their half-century struggle for self-determination, the Palestinians learned that armed struggle is the only vehicle for liberation. The popular revolts of 1921, 1929, 1936, 1946-48 and the emergence of the Palestinian resistance movement since 1965 testify to this fact. They also learned that the Contradiction in the middle East is between imperialism and its supporters on one side and anti-imperilist forces and national liberation struggles on the other and that this fight in international in nature. The defeat of Israel and Zionism, therefore, is a major defeat for all imperialist powers headed by the U.S. and a great victory for national liberation movements throughout the world. The Palestinians after all know quite well that liberation will be only achieved through sustained, continuous and protracted people's war that accepts no compromises or "happy middle solutions".

WHAT IS LEFT?

The Marxism-Ieninism-Mao Tsetung Thought Discussion Group of the McGill' Student Movement sponsors a revolutionary talk on

"If there is to be a revolution, there must be a revolutionary party."

This statement, made by Chairman Mao in 1948, is the summation of the historical experience of the proletariat. Ever since Marx and Engels issued the COMMUNIST MANIFESTO, incisively demonstrating that the proletariat will only emancipate itself by overthrowing the dictatorship of the bourgeoisie, the struggle to build and consolidate the revolutionary party to lead the revolution has been the main factor in deciding the success or failure of revolution and the seizure of state power by the proletariat. On this question Lenin pointed out:

"Repudiation of the Party principle and of party discipline -- such is the opposition's net result -- and this is tantamount to completely disarming the proletariat in the interests of the bourgeoisie. It is tantamount to that petty bourgeois diffuseness, instability, incapacity for sustained effort, unity and organized action, which, if indulged in, must inevitably destroy every proletarian revolutionary movement."

For a revolutionary today the primary task is to build a proletarian revolutionary party based on Marxism-Leninism-Mao Tsetung Thought and in the revolutionary style. When an analysis of the concrete situation reveals that such a party does not exist, then the task of the proletarian revolutionaries is to prepare the material conditions for the formation of such a party. Once this party has been formed, the task of the proletarian revolutionaries is to build it, strengthen it and ensure that it is capable at every stage of the revolutionary struggle of leading the proletariat and the broad masses of the people in seizing and consolidating state power.

In Quebec, the Communist Party of Quebec (Marxist-Leninist) is the proletarian revolutionary party. It is the task of all genuine proletarian revolutionaries to come under its discipline, uphold the principles of Marxism-Leninism-Mao Tsetung Thought and lead the people's revolutionary war for national liberation.

JOIN FRAP McGILL

MUNICIPAL ELECTIONS: October 25th is the date for municipal elections in Montreal. Until now more than half the population of Montreal has been disenfranchised. Now all undemocratic restrictions have been eliminated. Tenants can vote. 18-year-olds can vote. Students must vote and help mobilise the hundreds of thousands of Montreal citizens hitherto deprived of political, social, and economic rights.

"DEMOCRACY" WITHOUT OPPOSITION: The Drapeau-Saulnier regime has enjoyed ten consecutive years of rulw without formal political ppposition. Drapeau's Civic Party near-monopoly on City Council has rubber-stamped his impresario ventures while large segments of our population have been categorically denied decent recreational facilities, transportation, health care, and housing. The only o opposition has been citizens' committees and people's street demonstrations which have been repeatedly repressed.

TIME FOR CHANGE: On Oct.25, politics in Montreal will change. The Front d'Action politique (FRAP), a popularly based, democratic coalition of unions, citizens' committees, health clinics and left-of-center organizations is presenting a united front to oppose the Civic Party. FRAP will present candidates elected by popular assembly at the riding level in 12 of the 18 constituencies. Each constituency is represented by a Comité d'Action Politique (CAP), the local FRAP organization. The major thrust of FRAP's campaign will take place in the "grey zones" under-employed, under-educated, under-paid areas of the city.

FRAP IS A CHANGE FOR McGILL STUDENTS TO EXERCISE THEIR HUMAN RESPONSIBILITIES BY DIRECT POLITICAL ACTION.

VOTES: Find out who your FRAP candidates are. Make sure your name is on the electoral list. Vote FRAP.

FUNDS: Contribute to FRAP McGill. The Civic Party receives considerable sums sums of money from undisclosed sources while some CAPs have campaign budgets as low as \$300 to cover three candidates. FRAP McGill will turn over your funds to needy CAPs.



OPPOSE IAN SMITH'S VISIT. SUPPORT THE NEW

The McGill Debating Union has invited Ian Smith, former head control illegal colonialist regime of Rhodesia, to speak at McGill and many are rightly outraged by this idea. The Students' Society has condent the McGill Daily and the South Africa Committee have voiced strong of and a petition is being circulated. The Workers Communist Party has since its creation to build support for the liberation of the Zimbabw people and we, too, will work to prevent the racist Ian Smith from conhere. Our university must not provide a forum for a racist who devote his life to keeping 6 million African people in poverty for the benefication,000 whites.

The United Nations never recognized Ian Smith-he was an outlaw, the leader of an illegal regime. In Zimbabwe (which the racists called Rhoo under Smith, all political power (army, police, courts) was controlled by the whites. The average weekly salary for whites was eleven times higher that for blacks, the average amount spent on education of a black child we R\$46, of a white child, R\$557. The regime was based on the racist ideolog of the superiority of whites. The blacks had almost no democratic rights (to vote, to assembly, to trade unions, etc.).

Over 300,000 lives were lost in the armed struggle of the Zimbabwean people for national liberation. In February of this year, they achieved the hard-fought independence by massively voting for ZANU (Zimbabwe African National Union). This is the party led by Robert Mugabe which led the armed struggle for fifteen years. The new government is working to reconstruct the country. They face the task of feeding, housing and giving work to the one million refugees who fled the war into neighbouring countries and have now come home. ZANU stands for a non-racial, truly democratic society. They stand for an independent Zimbabwe, independent of the U.S., the Soviet Union. This is the new Zimbabwe which needs our support and deserves it:

Smith's very presence would be an insult to all of us, and particularly to students here from the third world. Last year, the South Africa Committee collected over 3,000 signatures calling for McGill to divest from South Africa. With the same internationalist spirit we must oppose Smith's visit. We must not give any money to the Debating Union for this purpose.

The Workers Communist Party supports all struggles in the Third World against U.S. and Soviet imperialism, and at this time, building support for the new country Zimbabwe is particularly important. During the elections there in February, we sent a journalist, Steven Griffiths, to Zimbabwe so that our newspaper, The Forge, could give Canadians a real view of what was happening there. We popularized ZANU's program, and denounced all attempts to prevent ZANU from carrying out their election campaign. We have always said that the only people in Canada who have ever had any interest in supporting Smith are Canadian capitalists. For years, Canadian companies made huge profits there, as they still do in South Africa. McGill students should work to support the Zimbabwean people, not to give support or any credibility to a racist. We invite everyone interested in the situation in Zimbabwe and in opposing Smith's visit to come to a conference on October 1. (see over)

TO THE

STUDENT'S BODY OF GREATER McGILL

The principal objects of the Universal Fee Proposal which you are to be asked to vote upon in a few days are as follows:

- (I) To make every student a fully paid subscriber to the McGILL DAILY and a member of the UNION, the MOCK PARLIAMENT, the LIT-ERARY SOCIETY and the CANADIAN CLUB.
- (2) To put the STUDENTS COUNCIL, the Athletic Clubs, the Union and the Daily on a sounder financial footing than at present.

It is proposed to do this by levying a sum of Ten dollars from every student, to be collected when he pays his University fees. Four dollars per man is now collected in this manner, of which Three dollars goes to the Students Council for athletics and One dollar to the Undergraduate Societies in the different Faculties. The extra fee therefore would only be Six dollars more than at present.

The Ten dollar fee would be distributed as follows:

To the Students Council \$4.50 (\$3.00 at present)

To the Union ... \$3.00 (\$10.00 at present)

To the McGill Daily ... \$1.50 (\$2.50 at present)

To the Undergraduate Soc. \$1.00 (as at present)

During the past few years undergraduates activities at McGill have experienced a marked advance, culminating this year in the winning of two championships in major sports and of four minor ones. Things have now come to such a pass that it is absolutely necessary, if we are still to progress that student activities should have more financial aid. The easiest and fairest way to ensure this seems to be to have each student pay a little more in fees (\$6.00) and let him reap the benefit of students organizations which he is at present unable to do.

Whereas all undergraduates now pay \$4.00 for athletics and undergraduates society fees (this sum being levied in any case by the University), and many also subscribe to the Daily at \$2.50, under the new system an additional fee of \$3.50 would entitle all students to memship in the Literary Society, the Mock Parliament, the Canadian Club and the Union, which now costs a total of \$11.00.

While the idea of having \$6,00 additional fee appears at first sight to be a large item, yet at the same time it is a very meager sum for the splendid advantages accessible and offered to every student. Under the existing regulations regarding caution money, a major proportion of this money is handed back to the student each spring, This present proposal as regards amount, practically means only the voting of the rest of our caution money as fees now stand. Caution money, by the end of the year is always considered more or less found money, hence it would in no way appear a grievance or hardship not to receive such an amount. The actual outlay for fees next year would be no more, and in many instances less than the total fees as now collected by the various faculties at the begining of each session.

STUDENT'S COUNCIL.

Under the universal fee the Students Couucil will receive a considerably greater revenue than at present. This will enable it to expand in new directions, and will place athletics and all the other activities whose finances it controls on a sounder financial basis. The Council will also probably be able to establish an endowment fund with the surplus, which will ensure it greater stability in future and in addition provide a reserve to draw upon in cases of emergency.

In the past few years the Council's expenses have increased greatly. It has assumed the support of the Mandolin Club, the Orchestra, the Vaudeville Show and two or three new athletic clubs. This year it will undertake financial responsibility for the Literary Society the Canadian Club and the Supply Room. New sources of revenue are thus absolutely necessary. It must be remembered that with the interests of the Council are bound up those of nearly every important student organization at McGill and that the Universal Fee, by strengthening the position of the Council will strengthen the position of every one of these.

THE UNION.

Everyone will be a member of the Union. There is no donbt that this was the original intention of Sir William Macdonald in making his magnificent gift to the students. It was to be a place where all could meet, independent of faculty or class; it was to foster a spirit of unity among all faculties, and was to be the centre of all students affairs.

While the Union has become the centre of students affairs, the high membership fee of this year has prevented many from joining. The present membership is only about one-fourth of the total number of undergraduates.
