(for all women students), and the Bursar's Office Macdonald College (for Macdonald College students). One ticket only to a student. The first 1200 students to be accommodated.

All students are urgently requested to wear Blazers, Red or White Sweaters, so that as much colour as possible may be available.

All students must be seated by 2:15 p.m.

Students must pin ticket on coat to retain a seat in the stand.

## THE NEW STUDENTS' RESIDENCES AND DINING HALL

The three Residence Buildings accommodate 664 men students, all in single rooms with exterior view. There are only seven rooms opening directly into each hallway, and the resulting privacy and quiet provide ideal conditions for study and rest. A fourth residence, to be built when required, will complete the project. The Dining Building, circular in shape, is divided into four segments in order to provide a separate dining hall for each residence.

**McCONNELL HALL** was named in honour of John Wilson McConnell, Governor Emeritus of the University and one of its great benefactors, whose handsome gift enabled the University to add a third residence to its original plans for two residences and a Dining Hall.

**MOLSON HALL** is a tribute to the Honourable Hartland deM. Molson, O.B.E., a Governor of the University since 1948 and a member of the Senate of Canada since 1955, and Thomas Henry Pentland Molson, E.D., for their substantial contribution to the construction of the residence centre.

**GARDNER HALL** bears the name of Bertie Charles Gardner, M.C., D.C.L., LL.D., leading Canadian banker and financier, Governor Emeritus of McGill University and its Chancellor from 1952 to 1957. He is a former President, Chairman of the Board and Chairman of the Executive Committee of the Bank of Montreal.

**BISHOP MOUNTAIN HALL** commemorates the first Principal of McGill University, the Reverend George Jehosopht Mountain, who later became Anglican Bishop of Quebec. He was appointed Principal in 1824 and held that post until 1835.

## McGill University,

Visit of Their Royal Highnesses  
**The Duke and Duchess of Cornwall and York,**  
Thursday, 19th September, 1901.

The Chancellor, the Governors, the Principal and the Vice-Principal will be in waiting at the Main Entrance of the Royal Victoria College, to receive Their Royal Highnesses and party, at half-past ten o'clock.

Those members of the Royal Party who are not in immediate attendance on Their Royal Highnesses will be at once escorted, by the Governors, to the seats assigned to them on the platform.

Meanwhile Their Royal Highnesses will robe in the rooms specially allotted to them, and will thereafter be joined, along with Their Excellencies the Governor-General, the Countess of Minto, and their immediate staff, by the Chancellor, the Principal, and the Vice-Principal.

One verse of "God Save the King" will be sung by the audience on the entrance of the Royal Party. Thereafter the Chancellor will present the address of welcome, and will then call on the Vice-Chancellor to confer the degrees of LL. D., in accordance with the vote of Corporation (adopted 12th September, 1901), first on

**His Royal Highness, the Duke**  
and then on

**Her Royal Highness, the Duchess of Cornwall and York.**

The Chancellor will invest the Duke and afterwards the Duchess with the appropriate hood, which will be held in readiness for each.

### BOUQUETS.

After the Benediction, (pronounced by Rev. Dr. Clark Murray), the Royal Party will leave the assembly Hall, and immediately thereafter such members of the University as are specially required to attend the opening of the new Medical Buildings will proceed down the eastern stair-case, and thence by the eastern door in the rear of the building to University Street. Subsequently, the remainder of the audience will descend by the eastern stair-case, and will leave the building by the door (Shuter Street end of the corridor).

Meanwhile the Royal Party will be escorted to carriages drawn up at the Main Entrance by the Chancellor, the Principal and the Vice-Principal. These University officials will go forward in advance on the route to the Medical Buildings, where they will be joined by the Dean of the Faculty of Medicine, and the Registrar, for the purpose of receiving the Royal Visitors at the front Entrance. The ceremony of declaring the new buildings open will then be proceeded with.
