New Activities Undertaken

by Graduates' Society

TO increase its usefulness to the University the Graduates' Society of McGill is this year extending its activities and opening up new possibilities of service for its members.

Many new committees have been established. These are not only extending the interests of the Society to new fields of worthwhile endeavour. They are also presenting opportunities for a greater number of graduates to participate actively in the affairs of the Society and direct their efforts to the benefit of the university.

The object of the Placement Service Committee is to organize and conduct, in conjunction with the university, a Placement Service for McGill graduates and undergraduates. It is hoped that the work of this committee will be extended by the formation of similar committees in the various branches. Organization of this committee recalls the services performed during 1931-35 by the Society's Employment Bureau which was operated for the benefit of unemployed graduates and former students. An even more complete and more effective service is being planned by the present committee.

The Branch Programmes Committee is already completing its plans for assisting the branches in arranging the type of programme in which graduates are interested. Closer contact with all branches has been a chief objective of the recent re-organization, and it has become an important part of the work of the recently-appointed Field Secretary. Further, a policy of holding regular conferences with branch executives has been inaugurated.

The Undergraduates' Interests Committee will foster a closer relationship between graduates and undergraduates. As it develops it should prove of real value to the university in the solution of both graduate and undergraduate problems. Already a new class and faculty set-up has been established for the closer integration of graduate activities. Under the new plan each graduating class nominates a Graduates' Society representative. All such class representatives of the graduating year form a committee and appoint their own chairmen with whom the executive and field secretaries of the Society will work to keep track of past students and maintain more closely the ties which bind them to the university.

Other Committees of the Society include: Membership, Reunion, Editorial Board, Management, University Problems, Radio.

The Graduates' Athletic Club, sponsored by the Montreal Branch, is renewing its



activities after a war-time suspension. Its purpose is to foster an active interest in amateur athletics among graduates of McGill and boys of high school age.

"McGILL NEWS"

Details of the work of the Committees and of all graduate activities are regularly reported in "The McGill News", the quarterly publication of the Society which since 1919 has been sent to every member of the Society. Besides information on university and graduate affairs, it contains articles of general interest and of cultural significance. During the war the "News" was sent free to every McGill graduate in war service. In those years a regular feature of the magazine was its record of the services of the 5,547 McGill men and women in the forces of Canada, Britain and the United States. In the compilation of this information the Society co-operated with the University War Records.

In the Second War as in the First, the activities of the Society were largely devoted to assisting the C.O.T.C. For this purpose the Sir Arthur Currie Memorial Gymnasium-Armoury was rushed to completion in 1940. This building was a Graduates' Society endeavour, as had been in earlier days the construction of the Percival Molson Memorial Stadium on Macdonald Park.

MEMORIAL

To provide a permanent and living memorial to the 293 McGill men who fell in the Second War, the Society in 1945 inaugurated a campaign with the object of erecting a Memorial Hall and Swimming Pool adjoining the gymnasium. The response exceeded all expectations. A thousand workers and six thousand subscribers contributed \$500,000 in answer to the appeal. A continuing campaign has been carried on in 1946 to make the Memorial even more outstanding by the addition of a rink-auditorium.

The Society has achieved much in the past; it is determined to achieve more in the future in fulfilment of its primary aims: "To advance the interests and promote the welfare of the University and its graduates".

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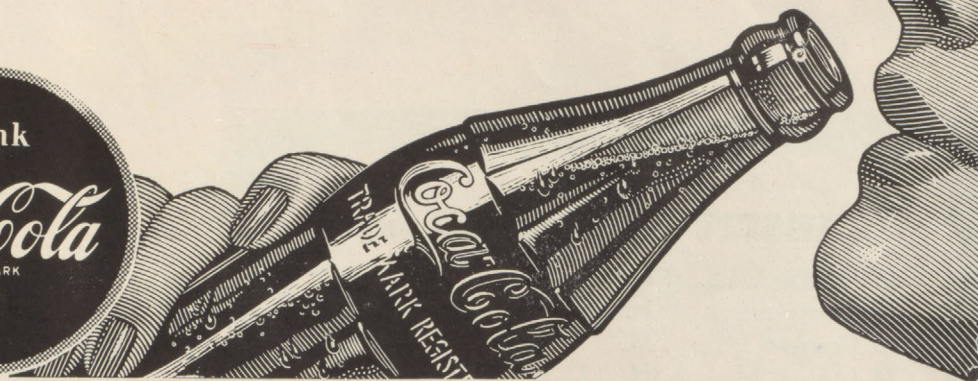
HARVARD - MCGILL RUGBY GAME

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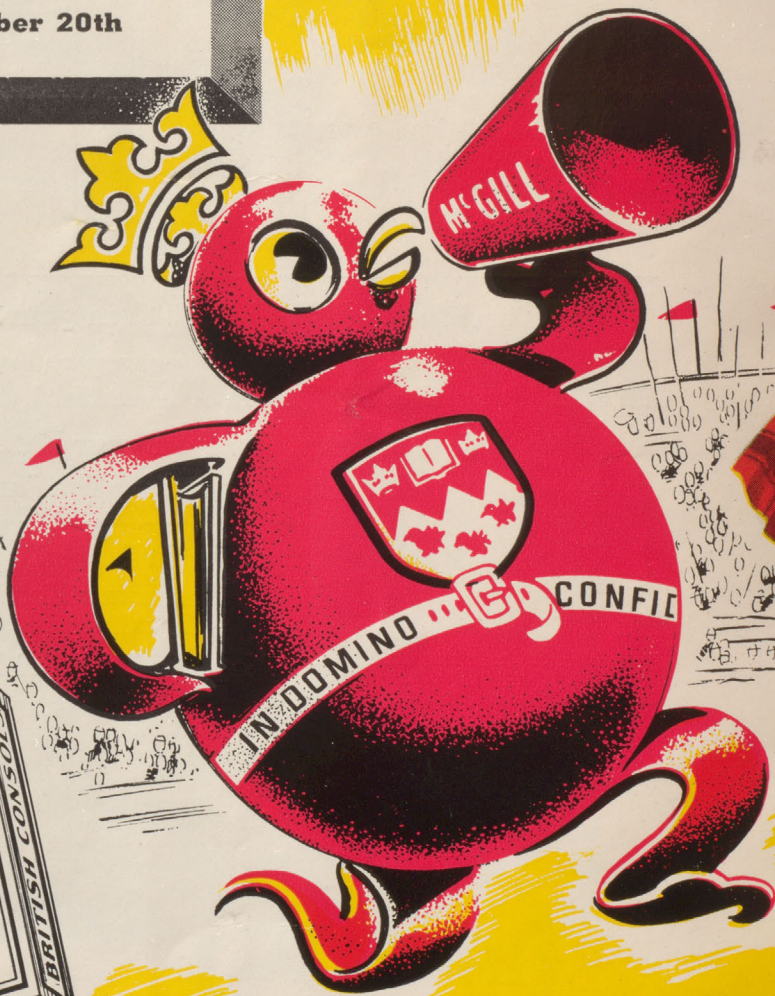

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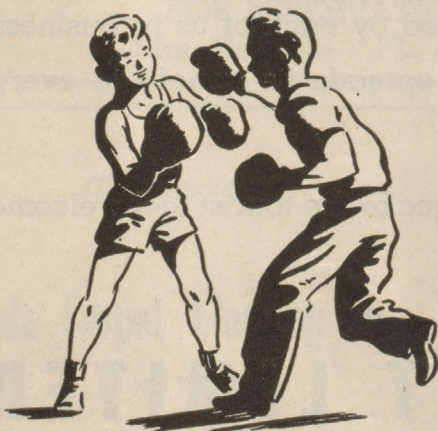

- MEL LAWSON is a Hamilton boy and a graduate of Forestry. Mel played for the Hamilton Wildcats, Dominion Champions in 1943, and in 1944 and 1945. He played quarter for last year's Blues, and is back in Graduate Studies this year. Mel's future — Lumber Business.
- GORD LAWSON is the second of the Lawsons in this year's team. He was with the Hamilton Wildcats last year before playing for Varsity. Gord is a second year Mining Geology and plans on Mining for a future.
- BILL LAWRENCE is a Toronto boy, a graduate of Runnymede Collegiate Institute. Bill played with Hagersville in the R.C.A.F. and with last Year's Varsity Blues. He is in Second year Civil Engineering at Ajax.
- DON FISHER is from Fort William, Ontario. He spent the summer at school after five years with the Army. As far as a future — Don is still undecided.
