Copy of paragraph from letter of April 5th from Dr. Casey Wood to Dr. Lomer.

"You have said nothing in answer to my query regarding the publication of my Annotated and Illustrated Catalogue of Ornithological Periodicals. As you know, I have spent a good deal of time and energy - not to mention money - on the same, and for the glory and advertisement of the University in general and of the Library in particular would like to see some such more or less original piece of work put out as a beginning of a serial open to every department. I wish you would write me quite frankly your opinion of this suggestion. The Catalogue will be ready very soon, indeed is practically in shape for the printer now, but if it is decided to go ahead with it for McGill I could polish it up some more - especially with the aid of the additional magazines that will undoubtedly be meantime acquired - and see it partially through the press when I am in Montreal next Fall. If the suggested plan cannot be carried out I shall have to adopt another, but much prefer the first, since I am convinced that the University is making a great mistake in not issuing a periodical, scientific in character, that will enable the Library more easily to exchange with similar publications of other Universities throughout the world."

Dear Prof. -----

I am sending a copy of this letter to each and every member of the Faculty of McGill College. The letter is confidential, therefore, only in the sense that any discussion of its contents had better, for the present I suggest, be confined to our own Faculty and to the members of any other Faculty of the University who may appear personally interested.

Several departments of the University have recently mentioned to me the possibility of publishing a departmental journal or series of approved departmental studies, and I need not say how praiseworthy these proposals are. There is, however, a bigger question involved in these proposals and that is the question whether or not McGill can any longer afford to do without a scholarly magazine similar to The University Magazine which was discontinued a few years ago. I know from personal experience East and West that The University Magazine was one of the best ventures McGill ever undertook, and the University owes a deep debt of gratitude to Sir Andrew Macphail for the careful, scholarly character of that Magazine. Why not revive The University Magazine or a similar magazine? I am convinced that COPY

the number of men in and about McGill who can contribute to a really first-class magazine is much greater than we sometimes suppose. Should we associate with us in any such venture our sister French University, the Universite de Montréal? The Magazine would, in any case, be bilingual. If the Magazine were issued periodically all University studies of an extended character might very well be published as a joint venture with the Magazine. Arrangements can at present be made for an office and for printing on a very reasonable basis. I should like to receive suggestions.

Dear Dean MacKay:

At a recent meeting of the Committee on University Publications the question of the most effective use of the limited funds at the disposal of the Committee was considered, and it was felt that an expression of opinion on the part of the various Faculties would be of assistance in planning future expenditures.

At present the fund at the disposal of the Committee amounts to \$3,397.00 of which \$897.00 represents the income from a Library fund and \$2,500.00 is an annual University appropriation. In addition, the Library pays \$500.00 a year for the services of an assistant to look after the distribution of publications. The fund has been used almost entirely for the purchase and distribution of reprints of periodical articles by members of the staff. The inclusion of titles was originally made on the suggestion of the writer until continued overdrafts led the Librarian to request the appointment of a Committee on University Publications in 1929. This Committee consists of the Deans, with the Librarian as Secretary, and it is responsible for the selection of papers and the distribution of funds. The handling of papers distributed and of exchanges received is still carried on as a part of Library routine.

The Committee is unanimous in feeling that the present system is not ideal and, in order to serve the interests of the University in the most effective way, the Committee on University Publications would welcome an expression of opinion on such points as the following:

> 1. The present system should be discontinued and the practice of distributing reprints should be abolished.

- 2. The present system should be continued with modifications, and definite suggestions as to practical changes are desired.
- 3. Reprints should be sent out by Departments to institutions and individuals interested and only two copies should be sent to the Library for binding and reference.
- 4. The fund should be used to aid in the publication of original manuscripts, special studies, and theses which have not a wide appeal but are important contributions within their special field.
- 5. The fund should be used to aid in the re-establishment of the University Magazine, so that McGill resumes its former position in a field already represented by, e.g., Toronto and Dalhousie.

The Committee requests that this matter be brought before your Faculty at its next meeting and that it may have an early reply to the various questions involved.

- 6. If more are required, or if the reprints are not issued free to the author, the funds of the Committee may be drawn upon for a limited number on application to the Librarian.

- 7. The series hitherto constituting the University Publications will now end with the last published number included in each case, and the Librarian will notify all institutions and individuals on the exchange list that the series have terminated.
- 8. Reserve copies now in storage will be used by the Library for exchange purposes as heretofore until the supply is exhausted. (This has already occurred in the case of certain papers).
- 9. The bulk of the funds available by the Publications Committee will henceforth be used for the purpose of aiding the publication of original literary, scientific, or historical material collected, edited, or written by members of the teaching staff and students of the University.
- 10. For consideration by the Committee, this material must be submitted by the author in a form ready for publication and with a definite recommendation by the Head of the Department concerned, including an estimate of cost, and suggestions as to publishing, methods of sale, and distribution.
