Dear Sirs:
The undersigned Governors of the University were constituted as a Survey Committee by a Minute of the Finance Committee of the Board of Governors on 24th January 1934. On the 7 th day of January 1935 they made a report in pursuance to the ir appointment which dealt with the affairs of the University. They now submit their report on the affairs of Macdonald College.

The relationship between McGill University and Macdonald College is somewhat indefinite in certain particulars. To obtain a proper appreciation of the situation, it is necessary to review the circumstances under which the University took over the administration of the College.

The following extract from the Minutes of a Special Meeting of the Royal Institution, Governors of MeGill University, held on the 18 th day of June 1906, indicates the purposes for which Macdonald College was endowed by the late Sir William Macdonald and the terms of the agreement by which the University assumed control of the College.

[^0]applied to the maintenance and extension of the said college, and of work carried on by it.

The founder desires that Macdonald College shall be incorporated with the University system and rank as a college of MeGill University; and that the Faculty of Macdonald College shall control the educational policy and curriculum of the said college, except as hereinafter provided, that is to say:
(a) Such University courses leading to a degree, as may be given in the said college, shall bo subject to the approval of the corporation of McGill University, and the examinations held in connection therewith shall be under the control of the University.

(b) Courses of study in the training of teachers for the Protestant Schools in the Province of Quebec, together with examinations held in connection therewith, shall bc under tho control of a committee on which the corporadion of McGill University, Macdonald College, and the Government of the Province of quebec shall have representtation.

Macdonald College shall furnish an Annual Report to the Corporation of McGill University.

All appointments to the staff of Macdonald College shall be made by the Board of Governors, acting in consultation with the Principal of the College.

The Board of Governors shall constitute from the Faculty of Macdonald College an executive in such a mannor as may bo from time to time determined.

Sir William Macdonald stated that as soon as certain gontlomon (whose names had been discussed and agreed to by members of tho Board present at the mooting) had been appointed to fill the vacancias on tho Board of Governors, he would, in pursuance of the above arrangement take the necessary stops to transfer by deed tho lands, and building of tho Macdonald Collogo at ito. Anne to the Board of Governors of the University, together with an ondowmont fund of $\$ 2,000,000$. He also stated that his gift was coupled with a condition - Which he wished to attach to all his gifts to the University, viz., that no part of the endowment fund should over be used for the orection of dormitories or other buildings for University purposes."

It is noticed from tho above extract that there are no provisions which indicate that the University intended to make itself responsible for any operating deficits that might be incured by the college. The agreement appears to be one of administration rather than acceptance of a donation. other facts, however, that seem to have a bearing on the situation are that Macdonald Colloge is not incorporated, that the University has merged with its own investments the greater part, but not all, of the investments with Which the College is endowed and that tho University has been firnancing the operating deficits of the College.

Due to the fact that the investments, buildings and grounds of the College are included in the accounts of the Royal Institution for tho Advancement of Learning, neither the Balance Sheet of that Institution nor the publishod Balance Sheot of Macdonald College reflects the actual position of tho collego. It is, however, worthy of mention that while the capital assets of the Collogo are included with tho assets of the Royal Institution, the sums that the Univorsity has advanced against the doficits of the College aro shown as Accounts Receivable under tho hoadings of "Deferred Charges" and "Advances to Endowed Departments and Colleges."

Your Committee has prepared a Balance Sheet of the College as at 30th June 1934, which is attached to this report as "Exhibit A." This Balance Sheet has beon prepared from the audited statements of the University and of the College and shows that tho Univorsity has advanced $\$ 396,939.16$ to tho Colloge and has roalizod a Not Profit of $\$ 143,572.13$ on the sale of socuritios from the Colloge Endorment. The rosultant figure of $\$ 253,367.03$ reprosents the Net Advances mado by the University.

Exhibit "A" shows that the accumulatod deficits to 30 th Juno 1934 amountod to $\$ 231,055.66$, which is the not result of the operations of the college since its incoption. The deficits on operations for the past five years have beon as follows:

Considerable economies have been effected during the current yoar, homever, the budget for which shows an Estimated Deficit of $\$ 31,806.00$.

These doficits include charges made by the Uni-
versity for interest on advances, which interest is included in the
University's income; and also a charge of $\$ 900.00$ per annum for technical advice regarding the Power House and other engineering matters. No other charge is made, howevor, for administrative supervision or investment service.

The question of the relationship between the University and the Colloge, the rosponsibility, if any, that rests on tho University to make itself responsible for the deficits of the College, the method that has been adopted by the University in merging some, but not all, of the Collego endowments with its orn investments and othor rolatod points are matters that should be investigated. Furthermore, if tho Colloge is to be considored as a separato unit as far as finances aro concernod, it seoms reasonable that the College should bear a part of the cost of tho University Administration。

Your Committeo, however, has not studiod these problems but has dealt with the College as an intogral part of the University.

The seriousness of the present situation is apparent and tho urgency of proper steps being takon to prevent futuro deficits is no less than in the case of the University.

For the purposes of this report, the Faculty of Agriculturo and the various departments of Macdonald College have been dealt with undor two main classifications, as follows:

## Academic Departments -

1. Faculty of Agriculture, divided into fourtoon departments.
2. School for Teachers and the Macdonald High School.
3. School of Houschold Scionce.
4. Library.

Building Maintenance, Service Dopartments, and Administration -

1. Building Maintenance
2. Servico Dopartments -

3. Administration


#### Abstract

A statement showing the Income and Expenditure of these Departmonts for the year ondod 30 th Junc 1934 is attached to this roport as Exhibit "B".

Exhibits "C" and "D" show the dotails of tho Dir- ect Income and Expenditure of the various Departments, togother With the number of staff, othor employoos and studonts.

The Faculty of Agriculture and tho other Dopartmonts aro doalt vith individually in this roport; but in considering any chango to any of tho oxisting courses that aro offered by tho Collego, tho effoct that such chango will have on tho number of studonts must be takon into account, together with the rosultant change in the total income of tho Collego. The Collogo buildings have beon designed to accommodate 150 men and 250 womon studonts and it is of great importance that these residences and the common dining room bo operated profitably.


## FACULTY OF AGRICULTURE

This Faculty, the only onc at Macdonald College, is divided into fourtoon dopartmonts, as indicatod in the attachod Exhibits "C" and "D". For the year onded 30th Juno 1934, the Faculty had Dircet Income of $\$ 103,563.93$, against Direct Expenditure of $\$ 214,100.67$, resulting in an Excess of Direct Expenditure of $\$ 110,536.74$. During the year it had a registration of 148 students, dividod as follons:-

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The activities of the Faculty have incroasod greatly since the founding of tho Colloge, most of which incroaso had boen necossitatod by tho changing methods of agriculturo and
its teaching. None the less, it is apparent that real economies have been made in the past five years.

The following table gives the total budgets of the Faculty for the years 1930-31 to 1935-36, compared with the actual results. The figures for actual results are those shown in the published statements of the College and have been prepared on a different basis from those attached to this report. The various years, however, are comparable and indicate the trend and that greater reductions in expenditure have been realized than estimated in the budgets.

Your Committee has examined the detailed budgets for $1935-36$ for each department and has come to the conclusion that the budget for the coming year, indicating a reduce Expenditure of $\$ 11,202$. is all that can be expected of this Faculty. All but \$51. of this Saving comes from reduced appropriations for the Agricultural Departments (as distinct from the Science Bepartments) of this Faculty, and involves a reduction in the number of breeds and varieties of stock and produce of the Experimental Farm. This, it is estimated, will result in a Loss of Income from the sale of agricultural products of $\$ 2,500$. and the Net Gain therefore from this reduced Expenditure is figured as $\$ 8,702$.

Students' fees for $1935-36$ are estimated at $\$ 500$. more than for $1934-35$, and hence the net reduction in cost of this Faculty should be about $\$ 9,200$.

It appears unreasonable to increase fees in this Faculty, in foct the original endowment was intended primarily to provide low cost education in agriculture. Furthermore, your Committee is of the opinion that, while greater reduction in expenditure is possible, it is undesirable that the activities of this Faculty be curtailed further. The solution of the problems of Macdonald College seems to lie in the other activities which are carried on there. If they can be dealt with effectively the present endowment will be sufficient to carry on the Faculty of Agriculture.

## SCHOOL FOR TEACHFRS

This School is the only Normal School for the training of teachers for tho Protestant Public Schools of the Province. Its students are those who are qualifying to teach in the elementary and intermediate schools. For students who wish to qualify as high school teachers there are courses of study given in the Department of Fducation at McGill.

In consideration for the training of both public school and high school teachors the University roceives from the Provirce an annual grant of $\$ 25,000 \%$. $\$ 15,000$. of which is allocated to the School, for Teachers and $\$ 10,000$. to the Department of Education at McGill.

In connection $\begin{aligned} & \text { ith the School for Teachers, Macdonald College }\end{aligned}$ operates the Macdonald High School, which serves the dual purpose of a High School for tho district and a practice school for the sehool for Teachers. For the year ended 30 th June 1934 , the Direct Income and Expenditure of these two Departmonts was as follows:-

Thess expenditurs are before any charge for Building and Grounds Maintenance or Administration.

Any changes that arc made in the present activities or cxpenditure of the School for Teachers must be mado aftor consultation With the Educational Authorities of the Province, and, consequently, a summary of the circumstances under which the School was started is given hereunder.

Prior to 1907 there had been oarried on in Montreal a school known as the McGill Normal School. This School was under the direction of a committee consisting of five persons appointed by the Corporation of McGill University which by government rogulation
was charged with its direction and superintendence. There was, however, no financial obligation on the part of the University for the maintenance of the School, the cost of which was oovered by an annual grant from the Government, amounting to $16,866.67$.

In view of Sir William Macdonald having erected, founded and endowed Macdonald College at Ste. Anne de Bellevue, it was agreed between the University and the Provincial Government that the McGill Normal School should cease to function and a School for Teachers be established at Macdonald.

By an agreement datec the 25 th-26th February, 1907. between the Royal Institution for the Advancement of Iearning and the Province, it was agreed that the University would undertake:-
> "I. To provide and maintain, at their own expense, upon the said property at Ste. Anne de Bellevue, class-rooms, laboratories, libraries, assembly hall, offices anc other rooms, fully equipped and in every way suitable for the purposes of a school for the training of teachers according to the present requirements of the Province;

"2. To carry on therein, at their own expense, a school for the training of teachers for the schools under the control of the Protestant Committee, the teaching and training to be given by said school to be in all respects equal to the present standard and requirements of the Province and to be carried on in accordance with the regulations made from time to time by the Protestant Committee; such training to include efficient courses in the study of nature, in household science, and in manual training;
"3. To provide and maintain, without experse to the Province of Quebec, upon said property, a suitable residence for the female pupils of said School and a suitable residence for the male pupils thereof;
"4. To give free tuition to such of the pupils as may give to their satisfaction an undertaking to teach in the Province of Quebec, and to supply board and lodging to the resident pupils as cheaply as can be done without loss."

In consideration of the University assuming these obligations, the Govermment agreed that the $\$ 16,866.67$ referred to above should be applied to the support of Protestant education in the Province. From $190 \%$ to 1915 inclusive the Government contributed nothing towards the School for Teachers. In 1916 and again in 1917 they made a grant of $\$ 5,000$ to the school. From 1918 to 1924 inclusive this annual grant was $\$ 10,000$. In 1925,1926 and 1927 no grant was made. From 1928 up to the present time the University has
received the annual grant of $\$ 25,000$. referred to on page 7 .
Tho activitios of the School for Teachers have steadily increased since its inception, the Direct Expenditure, including that of the Practice School, having increased from $\$ 12,122.00$ in 1908 to $\$ 53,318.57$ in 1934. During the same period, however, the Income, a part from the Provincial Grant, only increased from $\$ 575.00$ to $\$ 16,464.00$.

For the year onded $30 t h$ June 1934, the Excess Direct Expenditure as mentioned above amounted to $\$ 21,853.73$. To this must be added $\$ 17,090.00$, the proportion of Building and Grounds Maintenance and Administration estimatod applicable to the School for Teachers and Practico School. This wesults in a net excoss expenditure of $\$ 38,943.73$.

There is some doubt as to how the Provincial grant should be doalt with and whother or not tho prosont distribution is oquitablo. If Macdonald Collogo is an intogral part of McGill Univorsity, the question of how this grant should bo apportionod botweon the School for Teachers and the Dopartment of Education doos not effect the final figuros of Income and Expenditure, taking the two Institutions as a wholo. Your Committoc, thorofore, has not concornod itself With this quastion.

In contrast to the decreasc in Direct Exponditure mado by tho Faculty of Agriculturc, the folloring tablo shows that tho Dircet Expondituros of the School for Toachors and tho Practice School for tho past for yoars, have romainod almost the same. The fit guros havo beon taken from the published statements of tho College.

It is apparent that the coonomies which have been mado at Macdonald College in rocent years have boon at the expense of the Faculty of Agriculture and that thore has boon practically no curtailment of the activitios of the School for Teachers.

It is noted from the Extracts of tho Agroomont ontered into in 1907 that the University obligatod itself to carry on at its orn expense a School for Toachors "the toaching and training, to be given by said school to be in all respeots oqual to tho
present standard and requiremonts of the Province". As can be seen from a comparis on of the Direct Expenditure in 1908 with that in 1934, the activities of the School for Teachers have increased far boyond those contemplatod in 1907 and out of all proportion to the increase in income.

At the present time a special Committee appointed by the Board of Governors at the University is studying, primarily from an academic point of view, the whole question of the rolationship between the Department of Education at MicGill and the School for Teachers, and is considering the possibility of theso tro being amalgamated and operated at Macdonald Colloge under a now Agrecment with the Province. Subject to the rocommendations of this Committee, it is recommonded that the University endeavour to enter into an agreomont with the Educational Authoritios and the Province of Queboc, whereby the school for Taachers training Public School toachors and tho Dopartmont of Education giving High School teaching diplomas, would bo carried on at Macdonald Colloge With tho Colloge supplying tho nocossary facilitios of buildings, grounds, otc., but the instruction being carried on at the oxponse of tho Department of Public Instruction. Students roul a continue to pay their board and lodging as they do at tho present time and Would continuo to bo under the authority of tho Collogo for tho purposes of discipline, but the salarios and miscellanoous expensos incurrod rould be tho responsibility of the Provincial Governmont.

Your Committoo has formod the opinion that the total contribution from Macdonald College and McGill University towards the training of Protostant Teachors in the Province of Quoboc should bo tho provision of tho land and buildings nocessary for oporating a School for Teachors, the complcto maintonanco of such land and buildings, the accounting services and administration. At the presont time all thoso facilities and sorvicos aro boing supplied and in addition tho Collego is making itself responsiblo for Diroct Expenditurc of noarly $\$ 22,000.00$ per annum.

This School comes diroctly undor tho Faculty of Agriculture and may almost be considorod as a part thereof. A substantial part of the instruction is given by mombors of tho Faculty of Agriculturo and, as can be soon by reforonco to Exhibit "C", Salaries and Wages accounted for $\$ 20,095.13$ of the total Direct Expenditure of $\$ 22,903.98$. Direct Income in 1933-34 amountod to $\$ 13,429.67$, so that the Excess of Direct Expondituro for that year was $\$ 9,474.31$.

From an cxamination of the expenses of the
School no substantial reduction appears possible. Furthormore, $\$ 4,800.00$ of tho Salaries and Wages represent tho charges mado for instruction given by members of the Faculty of Agriculture. Any curtailment of the activitios of the School would not relieve the College of any of this $\$ 4,800.00$ but would simply increaso the costs of the Faculty of Agriculture. Another fact that has a bearing on the situation is that last yoar the school had a rogistration of 107 studonts. These students are of considerable importance to the profitable operation of tho dining room and rosidences. Taking all those factors into consideration, it appears that the only way in which an improvement can bo mado mould be to increase fees. At the prosent time students, other than farmers daughters, pay an annual fee of $\$ 100.00$. In this connection, homever, the authorities of the school point out that they are operating in competition with tho Ontario Agricultural Colloge at Guclph, ontario, and that at tho prosent time it costs a student more to attend Macdonald College than the Ontario College. They are afraid that any increaso in fees might rosult in studon ts that would ordinarily ontor Macdonald College going to the ontario College. Tho only recommondation thereforo that your committoo can make is that close study bo given to the question of the amount of fees charged and that as and Then the School has a sufficiontly high reputation the fees be raised to a point which will eliminato the doficit.


#### Abstract

From an examination of the budgot of this Dopart- ment, it does not appear that any economies can be offected.


## BUILDING MAINTENANCE, SERVICE DEPARTMENTS AND ADMINISTRATION

## Building Maintenance:

The total Expenditure of almost $\$ 86,000.00$ on the Power Housc, Buildings and Grounds, appears largo in relation to tho othor expondituros of tho Collogo, but your Committee is of tho opinion that theso expenditures are nocossitated by the extonsive buildings and equipment that must be maintained and the actual lay-out of the Colloge buildings. Your Committee has studied the payroll of the Building Maintenance Departmont, has compared the average cost of steam and has come to the conclusion that this Department is efficiontly administered.

## Servico Dopartments:

Your Committoo has includod undor this hoad the staff and student rosidences, the dining room, post office and laundry. By reforence to Exhibit "B", it will be seen that these Dopartments completely pay for their diroct expenditure and contribute a substantial amount to Building Maintenance. No depreciation on Buildings is charged into the costs and it is possible that greater expenditures should bo mado on repairs to buildings. However, the prosont contribution of $\$ 53,419.21$, mado Dy those Departments to total Building Maintonance of $\$ 85,997.44$, appears to bo reasonable and tho ratos charged for room and board of $\$ 7.50$ a Weok per studont cannot be held to bo oxcessivo. It appears, thoreforo, that these Departmonts are boing operated efficiently and economically.

## Aministration :

Your Committeo has considered tho cost of Admin-
istration in rolation to tho total expendituros of the Collogo and
has been forced to the conclusion that no substantial economy can be made in this Department. A groat deal of dotail recordkeering is necessitatod by tho activities of tho Experimental Farm and the sale of produco. The Building Maintenance Dopartmont is under the direct suporvision of tho Bursar and tho goneral incroasc in the activitios of tho Colloge has not resultod in a proportionate incroaso in tho cost of administration.

## GENERAL

A Comparative Statement of Estimated Revonue and Expenditure for the yoars onding 30th Junc 1935 and 1936 has boen prepared and is attached to this report as Exhibit "E". This statement indicates a reduction. in deficit of about $\$ 9,000.00$ for the year $1935-36$, as compared $\pi i t h$ the anticipated deficit of $\$ 31,806.00$ for the current year, and your Committeo feels that this is the rost that can be dono under the present circumstances. Your Committee's recommendations may be sum-
marized as follows:

1. That the budgot for the year 1935-36 be drawn up on the basis indicatod on Exhibit "E" attachod.
2. That a stronuous effort be made to rovise tho agrecmont under which the School for Teachers is operatod along tho lines suggostod in this roport, which new arrangoment should rosult in a saving to Macdonald Collcgo of some $\$ 22,000.00$ a year, or, in other Words, practically eliminato the ostimatod doficit.

[^0]:    "The Secretary read the following memorandum setting forth the terms of an arrangement which had been come to between Sir William Macdonald and the University providing for the incorporation within the University of Macdonald College at Ste. Anne de Bellevue.
    'Macdonald College at Ste. Anne de Bellevue, Que., is being founded and endowed by Sir William C. Macdonald for the following, among other, purposes:-

    1. For the advancement of education; for the carrying on of research work and investigation, and the dissemination of knowledge; all with particular regard to the interests and needs of the population in rural districts.
    2. Ta provide suitable and effective training for teachers and especially for those whose work will directly affect the education in schools in rural districts.

    The funds and assets of Macdonald College shall be under the management and control of the Board of Gover nors of MeGill University by whom they shall be exclusively
