II.—SUMMARY OF CHURCH UNION VOTE IN CONGREGATIONS IN THE PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH IN CANADA

In giving any statement of the exact situation of the congregations of the former Presbyterian Church in Canada one has to bear in mind the distinction between "congregations" and "pastoral charges." In the terms of The United Church of Canada Act a congregation means a worshipping unit, or single preaching station, and also a voting unit. Under the provision of the Act the vote on the question of union was taken by CONGREGATIONS and not by charges. In this statement, therefore, the figures dealing with the vote on Church Union must necessarily deal with congregations rather than charges. An attempt, however, has been made to arrange the figures in such a way as to show, both by congregations and charges, the actual situation in the three Churches at the date of the consummation of Union. June 10, 1925.

III.—CHURCH UNION VOTE IN CONGREGATIONS IN THE PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH IN CANADA

In the self-sustaining charges slightly over twenty-seven per cent. voted non-concurrence. In the aid-receiving charges less than ten per cent. voted non-concurrence.

Of the whole Presbyterian Church in Canada seventeen and onethird per cent. of the congregations voted non-concurrence.

There were 1,412 congregations in self-sustaining charges which remained in union, as against 534 congregations in self-sustaining charges which voted to withdraw as the Presbyterian Church in Canada entered the United Church of Canada. It is interesting also to note that only slightly over thirty per cent. of the whole membership of the Presbyterian Church in Canada voted against entering the United Church, while it is more interesting still to contemplate the vast numbers of those opposing union who accepted the verdict of their Church and loyally followed her into the United Church of Canada.

The total numerical strength of the United Church of Canada is impressive. Into the Church have entered 4,797 congregations of the Methodist Church, 166 congregations of the Congregational Churches, and 3,728 congregations of the Presbyterian Church in Canada, bringing the total on the 10th of June, 1925, to 8,691, as compared with 784 congregations which remained out. As a plain matter of fact a union of three great denominations in Canada has been effected with a loss of less than eight and one-half per cent. of the total congregations, and with a loss of about twelve per cent. of the self-sustaining charges.

Still more striking has been the attitude of the overseas foreign missions fields of the three Churches. Of the 655 missionaries of the uniting Churches on the foreign field on June 10, 1925, there are but seventeen (including men, wives and single women) who are no longer on the staff of the United Church of Canada. In addition to these there are six non-concurring missionaries with their wives, and two single women, who are continuing their work at present under the United Church of Canada.

At the same time the loss to the United Church of Canada of 784 congregations is in every way regrettable. Doubtless other congregations of non-concurrents have been formed, as a corresponding number of congregations have been formed by Unionist minorities. and time alone will reveal their ultimate strength. Nevertheless the United Church of Canada has started on its way with a great strength, a great heritage, a great vision and a great task.

Dear Sir Arthur: In connection with the file of applications to the Quebec Church Property Commission which I handed you yesterday, I feel that I ought to give you a word of explanation, and re-assurance. These claims were only handed to me by my clients at six o'clock the previous evening and I had no opportunity to investigate them at all before lodging them, as yesterday was my last convenient day for filing. Except in respect of four or five of the more important of them I had never been consulted and so far have had no opportunity to reach a conclusion as to whether, even in my own judgment, they are proper applications or not. From a casual examination, however. I saw at once that comparatively few of them are applications under Section 4-6 of the Act, in which cases alone your commission will be called upon to make specific orders. I do not think there are more than half of the dozen I anticipated of such claims. All the others are applications in cases of alleged "extreme hardship" under Section 5; but in these cases your commission is only authorized to make recommendations which will only be binding in the good faith of the parties. Even in respect of these they will be materially narrowed down by a few rulings in typical cases. I think you can, therefore, still feel that

Currie, G.C.M.G., K.C.B. - 2 22/5/26 while we have lodged far more applications than I personally ever contemplated the number of those which have to be discussed at any length will not substantially exceed our expectations. The form of application which has been used is a general form which I prepared in advance for formal use in all cases. I, therefore, made it double-barrelled so that it could apply either for applications under Section 4 or under Section 5. I stepped outside the effice where I was talking to you this afternoon when you started to speak on the 'phone, and before your conversation was ever, Colonel Bovey came along and as he had asked me to step in and sign a paper I went with him. When I returned, you were no longer where I had seen you.

You spoke of the disfavour your judgments as Chairman of the Church Property Commission were getting you into and expressed the belief that they would do harm to both the College and your reputation. "My only fear was that the University might suffer from criticisms which people would direct at me because of the findings of the Commission. The replenishment of our exchequer depends entirely on the good will of benefactors, the great majority of whom live in Montreal.

"For myself, I do not much care, but I am human enough to like to feel that I have, at least the respect of people. For popularity as such I do not care. The main thing is always to feel that you have done nothing with which you can reproach yourself.

"I assure you I appreciate very much your writing this letter and also what you said this evening."

How much more then, would be care for the good name and goodwill of the University suffering by the Cobourg trial if it went against him. This was the real worry of that trial.

His motto was, he said, "Thine own reproach alone do fear."
