poor William whom we ~~understand~~ can never hope to replace.

I am having such a delightful leave here in Oxford, doing nothing but read and fish and enjoy the glorious English may-time country. We have spent the whole day at Euclid lying in the grass among the old grey tombstones under the ewe-tree. Euclid far surpasses my wildest dreams ~~of what the country of~~ the last nine months of what the country should look like when I had leave. Yesterday was a glorious day as well & Dr Morse and I went fishing at Charlebury. We had splendid luck, catching 40 good trout, two of which weighed $3\frac{1}{4}$ & $2\frac{3}{4}$ lbs respectively. I am going to London tomorrow & I am taking them with me to have stubbed & ~~now~~ enshrined in a glass case to commemorate the day.
