Osler says that the "Practica" of Ferrari da Grado was also printed in 1471 repparently, it was not; and adds, "I missed a copy at Mosenthal's, Sept. '09. Dear Dr. Francis:

We have a request from one of our physicians for a quotation by Osler in which he mentioned that about six medicines were indispensable and that there were 18 to 20 he used from time to time.

We have correspondence from a doctor who says he was present when Osler made the statement in Philadelphia at the College of Pharmacy and Science in May 1907. The librarian at the College has searched their records and can find no indication that Osler made a speech there in May 1907.

Dr. W.B.McDaniel of the Philadelphia College of Physicians tells us that Osler addressed a semi-centennial meeting of the Philadelphia Pathological Society in 1907; however, there is no printed record of it. He has suggested that the statement, if correctly attributed to Osler, may not appear in his published works. Dr. McDaniel has further suggested that we ask your help in solving our reference problem.

Any assistance you may give us in this matter will be very much appreciated.

The intern should leave hospital knowing thoroughly ether, chloroform and the various preparations of opium and should carry ten or twelve drugs. "Which are they? This letter is written for a lady who is the widow of a doctor and who wishes to dispose of her late husband's effects. She has asked me what is the value of three volumes and I have no idea what it might be. I am wondering if you could make a rough estimate or could advise me where such information may be found.

The title pages in these books read as follows:-"The Works of John Fothergill, M. D. Member of The Royal College of Physicians and Fellow of The Royal Society, of London; and of The Royal College of Physicians in Edinburgh; and Corresponding Member of The Royal Medical Society of Paris. By John Lettsom. London: Printed for Charles Dilly, in the Poultry". Volumes One and Two show the date 1783 and Volume Three the date 1784 in Roman numerals.

The books are in reasonably good condition and although the leather covers are loose the pages are all in good order.

I would imagine that this sort of thing is difficult to evaluate at any time and that the amount that could be obtained for the books is dependant upon the availability of a purchaser with a desire for them. However, we would appreciate any suggestions that you may care to make.

I have just come across a Welch item which is not in your bibliography, 1917: "Pathology in its relation to general biology", Canadian Practitioner, January 1890, vol. 15, pp. 38-43. It follows a paper by Osler on "The etiology of malaris" which has escaped his bibliographers. The name of neither author appears in the index to the volume, only the titles of their papers. Both these papers, and others by Minot, Vaughan and Ramsay Wright, were issued the same year as a separate pamphlet, "University of Toronto. Formal Opening of the New Building of the Biological Department. December 19, 1889 ...". Toronto, J. E. Bryant Co., 1890. 23 pp. Q. In this reprint Welch's paper occupies pp. 10-15.
