The girl is Marian Emmons, her daughter, later Mrs. R. S. Humphrey of Boston. She was a great comfort to the Oslers in those last years and figures in the index of Cushing's bife of Osler. Her brother, Dr. R. van Buren Emmons, is the "undergraduate" in the snapshot with Osler opposite p. 378 of the second volume of Cushing. I do not remember to have seen this picture before. If you could conveniently send me another copy I should like to pass it on to Lady Osler's sister in Boston who will be interested and who will know the identity of the Red Cross commandant.
