Dear Cushing

What a fortunate thing that you operated, and took the risk! It is too bad that Edsall is not to go to St Louis. Look over the ground carefully. You have such a grip on the East that I can understand how loth you must be to go beyond the Mississippi. But there are plenty of good fellows there. I am pegging away at my Lumleian lectures. - Angina pectoris, trying to put together my private experiences. Allbutt will send you in few days the Pepys *memo* Magdalene College Cambridge. I was there on the 23rd - P's birthday, when they have an annual gathering. In the absence of Lord Grenfell I had to respond to P's memory - & fortunately had enough to say something.
