In history and biography the Oxford University Press announces "Mr. Secretary Walsingham and the Policy of Queen Elizabeth," by Conyers Read, in three volumes; "The Life of Sir William Osler," by Harvey Cushing; "Orlando Gibbons: A Short Account of his Life and Work," by Edmund H. Fellowes, uniform with the author's study of William Byrd, which appeared in 1923; "The Early Life and Letters of Cavour," by A. J. Whyte; "Revenues of Kings of England, 1066 to 1399," by Sir James Ramsay, in two volumes; "Edward IV.'s French Expedition of 1475: The Leaders and their Badges; Being MS. 2. M. 16 College of Arms," giving details of the "field state" and scales of payment of what was regarded by contemporaries as the best equipped army which an English king had ever led out of his own country, edited by Francis Pierrepont Barnard; "A Brief History of Civilization," by John S. Hoyland; "Social and Economic History of the Ancient World," by M. Rostovtzeff; "Prehistoric and Roman Wales," by R. E. M. Wheeler; "The Anglo-Norman Custumal of Exeter," edited for the first time by J. W. Schopp, who has collaborated with R. C. Easterling in an introduction to the volume, forming the second monograph of the History of Exeter Research Group; "Seventeenth-Century Statutes of Winchester Cathedral," by W. H. Hutton and A. W. Goodman, containing the Latin text with translation, introduction, notes, and two collotypes; "Prejudice and Promise in the Fifteenth Century," by C. L. Kingsford—the Ford Lectures for 1924; "Life in Medieval France," by Joan Evans; "English Life in the Middle Ages," by L. F. Salzman; "A Short History of the Building Crafts," by Martin S. Briggs; "Travel in Seventeenth Century England," by Joan Parkes; and "English Men and Manners of the Eighteenth Century," by A. S. Turberville.
