WILLIAM OSLER,

BART., F.R.C.P., F.R.S.

President of the Fellowship of Medicine and Post-Graduate Medical Association

> Bonhead, Ontario, July 12, 1849; Oxford, December 29, 1919.

THE Officers, Council and Members of the Fellowship mourn the loss of a beloved President to whose enthusiasm and devotion the Fellowship owes everything. Sir William Osler was the natural head of the Fellowship of Medicine as well as of the Post-Graduate Medical Association. Throughout the whole of his career he insisted upon the value, nay the necessity of postgraduate study, whilst the aim of the Fellowship of Medicine, a world-wide brotherhood, appealed with particular force to the imaginative idealism of a Master who had taught in the universities of three great nations, and whose name is revered wherever men gather together in the search for knowledge and for the advancement of medical science.

Osler has recently been described as "The Grand Old Man of Medicine." The phrase is scarcely a correct one. Great he was undoubtedly. But old he was not, and could never be. He discussed the eternal problem of youth and age in many of those fascinating papers and addresses which are not only inspirations for the reader but very delightful revelations of the author's personality. His name was popularly attached to a declaration that all men were too old at 40, and only fit for the lethal chamber. This statement he did not make. But he did say that "progress is an outcome of a never-ending struggle of the third and fourth decades against the fifth, sixth and seventh. Men above 40 are rarely pioneers, rarely the creators in science or in literature. The work of the world has been done by men who had not reached la crise de quarante ans." Not once, but many times, he drew attention to this crise (the phrase is a favourite one, and reappears in his essays), the imperceptible change "which impels a man to open rather than to vault a five-barred gate." He noted, over and over again, the "loss of mental elasticity which makes men over forty so slow to receive new truths." The idea pre-occupied him, and throws considerable light upon his own standpoint as a teacher. "The only safeguard in the teacher against this lamentable condition is to live in, and with the third decade, in company with the younger, more receptive, and progressive minds." .

Let me not live . . . After my flame lacks oil to be the snuff Of younger spirits whose apprehensive senses All but new things disdain.

This sympathy with the younger generation was one of the secrets of Osler's peculiar and widespread influence, and also the explanation of his own freshness of spirit. He was keenly alive to the dangers of "intellectual staleness." "There is no sadder picture than the professor who has outgrown his usefulness," he wrote in 1892. In 1900 he was warning an audience of post-graduate students against the clutches of "demon routine. . . The mind, like the body, falls only too readily into the rut of oft-repeated experiences." "To maintain mental freshness and plasticity requires incessant vigilance," but he would accept no apology for the "all-prevailing vice of intellectual idleness." The man whose life was directed by such rules of conduct could not possibly grow old in the ordinary acceptance of the word.

In his zeal for knowledge he set up standards which he realised were difficult to follow. In a charming passage of a lecture to students he admitted that "by nature man is the incarnation of idleness, which quality alone, amid the ruined remnants of Edenic characters, remains in all its primitive intensity. Occasionally we do find an individual who takes to toil as others to pleasure, but the majority of us have to wrestle hard with the original Adam, and find it no easy matter to scorn delights and live laborious days." But, if he had consideration for the weaknesses of youth, he had no mercy for "unrefreshed, unregenerate teachers." He spoke with brutal directness of the "blight of intellectual old fogeyism" which imperilled his profession. How could it be overcome? Once

past the fatal age, the crisis of forty, "we teachers and consultants are in constant need of post-graduate study as an antidote against premature senility. Daily contact with the bright young minds of our associates and assistants, the mental friction of medical societies, and travel, are important aids. Would you know the signs by which in man or institution you may recognise old fogeyism? They are three. First, a stage of blissful happiness and contentment with things as they are; secondly, a supreme conviction that the condition of other people and other institutions is one of pitiable inferiority; and thirdly, a fear of change, which "not alone perplexes but appals."

Those who worked with him in Montreal, Baltimore, and Oxford can more ably describe the appeal of his character. Many indications are scattered across his published works, in which he surveyed problems of life as well as of medicine. Indeed, he was careful not to separate unduly one from the other. When he advocated "a deep and enduring interest in the manifold problems of medicine" he immediately added that the interest in "the affairs of our brotherhood" was to be "a human interest." He was a man first, and a physician afterwards, and mingling with a bubbling humour was an infinite compassion and tenderness towards his fellowkind.

"Curious, odd compounds are these fellow-creatures, . . . , full of fads and eccentricities, of whims and fancies; but the more closely we study their little foibles of one sort and another in the inner life which we see, the more closely is the conviction borne in upon us of the likeness of their weaknesses to our own. The similarity would be intolerable if a happy egotism did not often render us forgetful of it. Hence the need of an infinite patience and an ever-tender charity towards these fellow-creatures; have they not to exercise the same towards us?"

As a physician his life's work will be chronicled in other pages. Here it seems more fitting to refer to his zeal for medical education, his "relish for knowledge" (a phrase he borrowed from John Locke) based upon a humanistic scholarship too seldom at the call of men of direct action and public affairs weighted by the unceasing activities and strain of busy careers. His reading was extraordinarily wide. Sir Thomas Browne's Religio Medici he confessed "was one of the strong influences which turned my thoughts towards medicine as a profession, and my most treasured copy—the second book I ever bought—has been a constant companion for thirty-one years—comes viæ vitæque. Trite but true is the comment of Seneca— . . . if you are fond of books you will escape the ennui of life, you will neither sigh for evening disgusted with the occupations of the day—nor will you live dissatisfied with yourself or unprofitable to others."

He wished every medical man to make use of books. ("It is astonishing with how little reading a doctor can practise medicine, but it is not astonishing how badly he may do it." And again, "a well-used library is one of the few correctives of the premature senility which is so apt to overtake the general practitioner.") He imagined in every library a select company of the Immortals set apart for special adoration. Students might thus hope to gain that mental perspective which is so valuable an equipment in life. Whilst attacking Old Fogeyism he was a valiant upholder of tradition. The motto of conservatism, he said, was "Prove all things, and hold fast that which is good," whilst the motto of Old Fogeyism was "Prove nothing, but hold fast that which is old."

'Tis man's worst deed To let the things that have been run to waste And in the unmeaning Present sink the Past.

In his papers and addresses he was at his happiest when talking about books. He seldom lost an opportunity of inculcating the value of the humanities in medical education. "Medicine is seen at its best in men whose faculties have had the highest and most harmonious culture. The Lathams, the Watsons, the Pagets, the Jenners, and the Gairdners have influenced the profession less by their special work than by exemplifying those graces of life and refinements of heart which make up character."

To this list of "noble natures gone" must be added the name of William Osler, a great teacher supremely endowed not only in knowledge but also in those rarer and more lovable gifts of grace of life and refinement of heart.
