The College could not well take action, as it was not altogether certain how far the Editor of the R.E.M. had (not) compromised some of the younger Fellows. I saw Barlow in town yesterday and talked over the whole business. He much regretted Duckworth's remarks, and explained why it was impossible for the College to take up the matter: Very reluctantly I agreed to withdraw my resignation./
