5th ed reprinting in 1916. "Preface to <sup>the</sup> Eighth Edition" is followed on next leaf by "Preface" [not dated] saying that "the need for reprinting has given the opportunity to make a considerable number of alterations" - in typhoid, paratyphoid cerebro-spinal meningitis etc.

Editions versus printings

What is an edition - first used for reprint -

"New edition" usually shows some material alteration -

2nd printing often described as 2nd edition

Many Publishers recognizing the home tastes the public into their confidence and welcome become familiar with the more familiar "first thousand"

50<sup>th</sup> thousand etc, a practice which stimulates universal of readers are to be told anything about the sale figures.

Some ~~edit~~ publishers have gone so far as to make 8 Eds out of a first printing of 500 copies like an "Army" paper

Stopping the machine they now then to <sup>and</sup> change the suitable legend.

So whatever the no of Editions and printings the essential thing is that one knows copies
