I was very pleased to receive your letter about Sir Wm. Osler, and am only too glad to send you what letters I have kept and what information I have about his goings too and fro in this region- I felt that I had friendship more than mere acquaintanceship with him, and he was so helpful and encouraging. He did a good deal for me, and it was a great pleasure to be with him.
