My dear Mother

Up here, in this far north region, I had forgotten the distance from Liverpool & co. let Canadian mail day pass, thus however will reach you via New-York. Since I started, I have visited many new places & met many new people. I left London on Thursday evening for Edinburgh by the London & North Western via Carlisle I was fortunate in having a nice travelling companion & one who knew something of old friends; it was a gentleman from the West Indies, who knew Dr. Bovell intimately & had seen him written the last two months.

He gave a very nice account of him  
his doings which naturally inter-  
ested me very much. I managed  
to sleep pretty fairly, though not  
as I would have in a Pullman  
We arrived in Edinburgh at 9.30  
A. M. on Friday morning, too late  
to take the through train to Aber-  
deen, so that I left me four hours  
to examine the city. I was much  
struck with its beauty; I need  
anything in cities I have yet seen;  
Princes St. in particular, leading  
up to the Citadel, is wonderfully  
picturesque. I found out young  
Drasset (of Toronto) who is studying  
medicine at the University - un-  
der his guidance did the ward  
of the Royal Infirmary (the  
chief hospital of the city) a suc-  
cessfully old place, as you  
may imagine as it was built  
in the beginning of last cen-

any. The Scot memorial is a very  
handsome structure, the next  
thing of its kind to the "Albert"  
one in London. The trip from Ed-  
inburgh to Aberdeen, though very  
long & tedious in consequence of del-  
ays, was enjoyable enough, as  
the scenery is beautiful; the chief  
portion of the railway running  
close to the German ocean. We  
had to cross two firths, in a lumpy  
sea, which unsettled the stomachs  
of not a few. At Aberdeen I was  
met by Mr Alex Cochran who  
took me to his house, where I slept  
that night. In the morning I  
had a few hours to spy out the "Gran-  
ite city". It is very regularly built  
somewhat too uniform, but has  
a delightful cleanliness about it  
which to a Londoner like myself  
was very refreshing. I left at

at noon for Glenurquhart. Mr & Mrs Smith's  
place, where Edmund was staying.  
it is a nice spot & he has recently  
rebuilt his house, in grand style.  
Both he & his wife seem very delicate,  
but probably his trip to Canada  
with Edmund will do him good.  
In the evening we went on to Bal-  
forn, the Cochrane's place & there  
received a hearty welcome from  
Miss Cochrane. The trip up the  
seaside as far as Aboyne is  
very lovely, but up toward Bal-  
forn it is still more so. I will  
have to postpone the account of  
my journey to the Aberdeenshire Highlands  
as I wish this to catch the Friday  
mail via New-York. We go down  
to Edinburgh again & from thence to  
Glasgow & the Western Highland  
but won't call this by the Caw-  
ard. I hope all an well, much  
love. Yours in haste Willie
