Old Boys' Association Elect Officers at Annual Meeting.

Looking to the jubilee celebration at Trinity College School at Port Hope there has been much activity recently on the part of the Old Boys' Association. The annual meeting of the association was attended by a large and representative number of old boys, which included many of the most prominent professional and business men of Toronto.

Extraordinary interest was taken on account of the large number of old boys of the school who are serving in the Imperial army and the overseas contingents. No less than about one in ten are so serving.

Plans are being laid for a grand gathering of old boys at Port Hope on May 24th to celebrate the fiftieth anniversary of the founding of the school, which has often been referred to as "The Eton of Canada." These plans comprehend the old boys leaving Toronto by special train on the morning of Monday, May 24th, to spend the day at the old school and to renew old associations and friendships and play the time-honored cricket match between the Past and the Present.

The traditions of Trinity College School date back to the days of its origin at Weston in the year 1865, when it was founded by the Rev. W. A. Johnson, father of Dr. Arthur Jukes Johnson, a well known present resident of Toronto, with the Rev. Charles Howard Badgley as head master. From Weston the school was moved to Port Hope in the year 1870 when Mr. Badgley resigned, and was succeeded by the Rev. C. J. S. Bethune, who guided the destinies of the school as head master for upwards of 29 years. The present head master is the Rev. F. G. Orchard, M.A., of Oxford.
