There was one incident of this Congress that may be mentioned as it introduces  
 a ~~new~~ name to appear in a later chapter. At this period Dr S.D. Jones of Philadelphia  
 who had been President of the international gathering in Boston Philadelphia in 1876  
 his unpopularity at this time the dean of American surgery. He had been prevented  
 from attending the London Congress but sent in his stead his son who  
 had recently married Mrs. George Linzee Peck of Boston. They visited  
 the <sup>the</sup> Regius Professor of Medicine in Oxford, Sir Henry Addard and Dr. Jones  
 could trace from one of the <sup>senior</sup> members of the Congress saying that he had  
 heard a swarthier young Canadian named Calder gave one of the best
