Dr. Spragues account is not very satisfactory - tho. no judgement can be given at so early a stage while he still suffers so from the loss of blood. I have urged a rigid out of door plan of treatment. He may object at first. The difficulty is to arrange it satisfactorily in a private house, but many cases do so well, even at home, that it is worth the trial. After the fever subsides & the blood condition inproves he might be able to get away to some more suitable climate. The danger is left it's one of these very acute forms, which often set in with severe hemorrhages. I have asked Dr. Sprague to let me know how he gets on. Do urge upon the lad the importance of giving the open-air treatment a full trial.
