Your letter of 7 Aug. about letters of Sir William Osler found me in Belgium. Since returning home I have turned over my files of letters, & regret that there are none from him except short scraps, written in haste.

One, of which I treasure the memory, was written on the appearance of the first volume of my Letters of Erasmus; & conveyed in a few lines that cheering encouragement that always flowed out from

him to anyone who seemed to be trying.

I must have it somewhere, tho' it eludes me
at the moment: but it is scarcely long
enough in any case for yr consideration.

I enclose a copy of a postcard wh. he
wrote just before the end - still full of
courage. The original lives in his little
book of Life, & will always be one of our
treasures.

He was indeed one of the Saints of God,
a low beloved of men! we never think
or talk of ^{him} without feeling the thrill of
encouragement that he spread round him.
