Two weeks ago the Press announced that the dair of practice of medicine in the Jefferson had been affered to Dr William sler, who is now professor of practice of medicine in Johns Hopkins University, Baltimore. At the meeting of the Jefferson faculty Friday night it was decided to recommend Dr Osler's election, in spite of his refusal to accept their offer. The position carries a salary of \$6000 a year, which of itself would not tempt Dr Osler to leave a \$5000 position in Baltimore, where the university has had a complete laboratory fitted up for his especial use. However, Dr Osler said recently to a friend here that he would like to return to Philadelphia, and it is said by his friends that if the salary at Jefferson were increased to \$10,000 Dr Osler would likely accept. It is supposed that the trustees if they elect him will do so with the understanding that the "terms shall suit".

In the event of this plan falling through, Dr James C. Wilson, one of the four chief visiting physicians to the Jefferson Hospital, will bepushed as a candidate. He graduated from the college in 1849 and has a large private practice.
