Osler's paper on Tuberculosis in the Johns Hopkins Hospital

In 1899 W. O. through the generosity of friends arranged that one of the medical students should visit the home of each new case of consumption coming to the Johns Hopkins Dispensary, to report upon the hygienic surroundings and to assist the patient and family to an understanding of the nature of the disease and the necessary measures for its prevention. Miss Dutcher was the first appointee, a fourth-year student, and the account of her work was read before the Lannec Society at its first meeting, October 30, 1900. It is probably the first systematic account of a domiciliary visitor attached to a dispensary. Miss Dutcher's work was so promising that other women medical students, Miss Blauvelt in 1901 and 1902, and Miss Rosenkrantz in 1903 continued it. In 1904 a trained nurse, Miss Thelin, took over the work, Lady Osler collecting the money for the payment and it has since been continued.
