One day, sitting at the open window of his little house, there passes a group of workmen, whom he greeted in his usual friendly way, and then said, "Ah; the glory of the day's work, whether with hand or brain." Possessed in rare degree of the Greek combination of the love of humanity with the love of a craft - philanthropia and philotechnia - he tried -

To exalt the preshet and the real, To teach the average man the glory of his daily work or trade, And this, as I read it, was his message.
