Dear Harry T.-

Beevor was delighted with his visit to you and greatly appreciated all the care you and Mrs. Thomas took of him.

It is delightful to hear that Hal has done so well at Haverford. I do hope he may get over here on a Rhodes Scholarship.

When Mrs. Worthington and Mary were here about three weeks ago, having just walked up from the river, I thought Mary's lips looked a little blue and I suggested that it might be well to have her heart overhauled again. This I did yesterday. The condition is not materially altered. The apex beat is not very far out and not specially heaving. There is a very loud apex systolic heard to the left and at the back and also up the left side of the sternum. I do not think there is any question as to its being an acquired rheumatic mitral endocarditis and most unlikely to have been congenital. I should say the outlook for her was very good. If there is any further trouble with the tonsils they should come out, and she has got to recognize her limitations, particularly in the matter of exercise.

Revere is very well. We hope to go to Scotland to try to get some good fishing. I am fairly feeble, but still in the ring.
