Dear Mr. Phipps:

I hope you and Mrs. Phipps have had a good winter. Isam looking forward to seeing you in New York very shortly. I was to have sailed on the 14th, but I have been laid up with a heavy cold. I shall be able to leave next week. We had a delightful winter in Italy - everything perfect but the weather. We spent a month in Rome, and a month in Florence, and I saw the old University towns - Bologna, Padua, and Pavia. They are doing good work in Italy - the malaria mortality has been reduced from 24000 in 1808 to 4000 in 1908, largely owing to the education campaign of the Anti-Malaria Society. I wish they could stir up the public about tuberculosis, but the people are very apathetic.

Mrs. Osler does not come out with me. Mrs. Revere is to pay her alvisit this summer. Revere is well, very busy with his butterflies.

I will look you up at once after arrival. I shall be at the University Club.
