ELECTION INTELLIGENCE. Oxford University.

The following letter is being circulated among the medical and scientific graduates of Oxford University: -

> The Museum, Oxford. Nov. 29, 1909.

Dear Sir: - In the forthcoming election of Burgesses for the University of Oxford you will have an opportunity to vote for two of the three candidates, Mr. Arthur Evans, Sir William Anson, and Lord Hugh Cecil.

We venture to think that, as Warden of All Souls and intimately associated with the life of the University Sir William Anson is a legitimate representative, in every way deserving of support. But in regard to the other candidates we desire to urge the claims of Mr. Arthur Evans, chiefly for these reasons. First, he is a distinguished scientific man, an ornament to the University and to the country; secondly, from a life-long residence in Oxford he knows the local conditions thoroughly; and thirdly, he is in hearty sympathy with the measures of university reform which, on the initiation of the Chancellor, are at present under discussion, and the fate of which must be settled shortly, either by Convocation or by a Royal Commission.
