From the Regius Professor of Medicine, Oxford.

Dear Camac,

(for military service with British)

It is awfully good of you to offer your services. I wish there were some good billet, but the places I know are all full. There is, as yet, no scarcity on the medical side, but later, when these 600,000 men are settled as regiments, there will be a demand. Of course, one difficulty in official positions, is that a man must be a British subject. If anything really good should turn up, I will let you know at once.

I hope Mrs. Camac is better. My love to her and to the girls.

We are very busy, as you may suppose. Grace has been helping to settle some twelve Louvain professors and their families. We have had a splendid response from America to our appeal. It has been an awful tragedy for these poor sould, many of whom are absolutely destitute. I have just got back from Folkestone, near which we have opened our Canadian Hospital. It has just been filled with Belgain wounded.

Revere has come up to Christ Church and is in the Training Cmpsining company.
