The Sunday on which this letter was written was almost certainly March 7th, 1915. This is deduced from the fact that Sir William Osler gave an address on cerebro-spinal meningitis to the Wiltshire Branch of the British Medical Association at Salisbury on Thursday, March 11th, 1915. This address was not reported, but he had published a paper on "Cerebro-spinal Fever in Camps and Barracks" in the B.M.J. of January 30th, 1915. It begins by making reference to "slight outbreaks in two of the camps in this country".
