Dear Mac:-

I have written to the Leas telling them about the distribution of the money.

So glad to hear that you have nearly got vol. v finished. What a deuce of a job you have had with this, but I suppose it has been worth while!

At present we are marking time here, waiting for rifles and munitions generally.

The general impression is that the recruiting has been far better than one could have supposed. They are certainly getting a very satisfactory looking set of men.

I am seeing all sorts of interesting cases. Poor young Captain Darling, of Toronto, died yesterday. I saw him several times with Symonds with a wound of the subclavian, septic and recurring haemorrhage and widespread thrombosis of the vessels.

I am doing work on the Text-Book every day, and will send you a scheme before long.

St. Chapin is here. She and Grace are both hard at work. Had a letter from Jack
this morning. He seems in good form. Potter has been here, and comes to us for the
week-end.
