About your unit. - It would be well for Hutchinson to see Brewer of New York, or Cushing, when he returns, about their arrangements at Paris, as they could give all details. For 150 beds you would not need a very large personnel.

After a lull, the wounded are beginning to pour in again, particularly the Canadians, who have been very hard hit. It seems impossible to avoid infection in the severe shrapnel wounds. On the other hand, it is astonishing how many bullet wounds, even through the chest and abdomen, heal promptly. I am much interested in the arterio-venous cases, of which I have seen six. I will send you a lecture shortly on the subject.
