From the Regius Professor of Medicine, Oxford.

Dear Ned.

Sorry to hear that you have had more trouble with your eyes and still more so with your ears. I am afraid that it is a type associated with age and the hardening of the tissues in the ear, which is very difficult to help by any apparatus. On this you might safely take O'Common's opinion, as I have heard of him as

a very good man.

We are very busy. I am connected with three or four hospitals and have to be away a great deal, but the work is most interesting. The Canadians have covered themselves with glory, and everybody is talking about their bravery. We are getting back a lot of wounded, among them my sister's son, Campbell Gwyn, who has a bullet in his arm. Revere is joining the McGill unit as Colonel Birkett's orderly officer. We has been for nearly three months at Cleveden, where he has picked up a good deal about his duties. We are expecting the WcGill people over at any time. I think they will take charge of a large hospital somewhere in France.
