Sunday, Sept. 8, 1918.

W.O. and I arranged recent reprints into eleven piles. He has them bound and gives them away in sets. Thinks he will write a sort of introduction telling of those things which he had hoped to do. Says it is a marked sign of senility to make a bibliography. We went down to the Mitre and saw some Amer. attached to the Amer. Embassy - Jerome Green, 'Bobby' Grant, Billy Paton, Bronson Cutting, Edgar Wells - and we went to Merton Library where P.S. Allen showed us about. W.O. says he must have a secretary. Told us at lunch that Dr. Bowditch on W.O.'s first visit to Boston told him to get lots of reprints articles right from the first as he would give thousands of dollars to have some of his own. W.O. thinks seminaries of special libraries for laboratories are of great use. He is so glad that U.S. is in the war and will dictate terms of peace. W.O. busy with the talk he gives at Shorncliffe on the medical profession he gives tomorrow night.
