Dear Shepherd,

I am very distressed to hear of Mrs. Gardner's death. I had a very warm appreciation for her. I can realise what a terrible blow it will be for poor Gardner.

Sorry to hear you have not been well, but it could not have been anything special lasting for two years.

I was glad Adami was elected at Liverpool as his work was practically over at Montreal. He will make a very good head for them. We have been having a busy time as usual. We had the Classical Association here, and I hope you will have my address on or about July 12 with my birthday greetings. I enclose you a list of books that I had out one afternoon, and a catalogue of a remarkable exhibit of old scientific apparatus.

Sharkey was asking after you the other day: I have not seen Sherry for months. Martin has been a great success over here - he gets things done. You will be greatly pleased with Whitnall - a good type of man and a good combination of knife and fork and scientific anatomist.
