We have had a fine rest here. So sorry to have missed you.(1). On my return I will send the Cusa translation which is excellent.(2). Look up the question of the balance and the story of the weighing out of seed and ashes. There is material for a good paper. He was a great man.

I am finishing the revision of my text book-new system very through-so many quarts to put in pint measures.

Let me hear of your plans. I suppose you will be demobilized soon.

Love to Dr. Cushing when you see him. I enclose a bit of poor Mercier, who went down as he promised with all the flags flying.(3).
