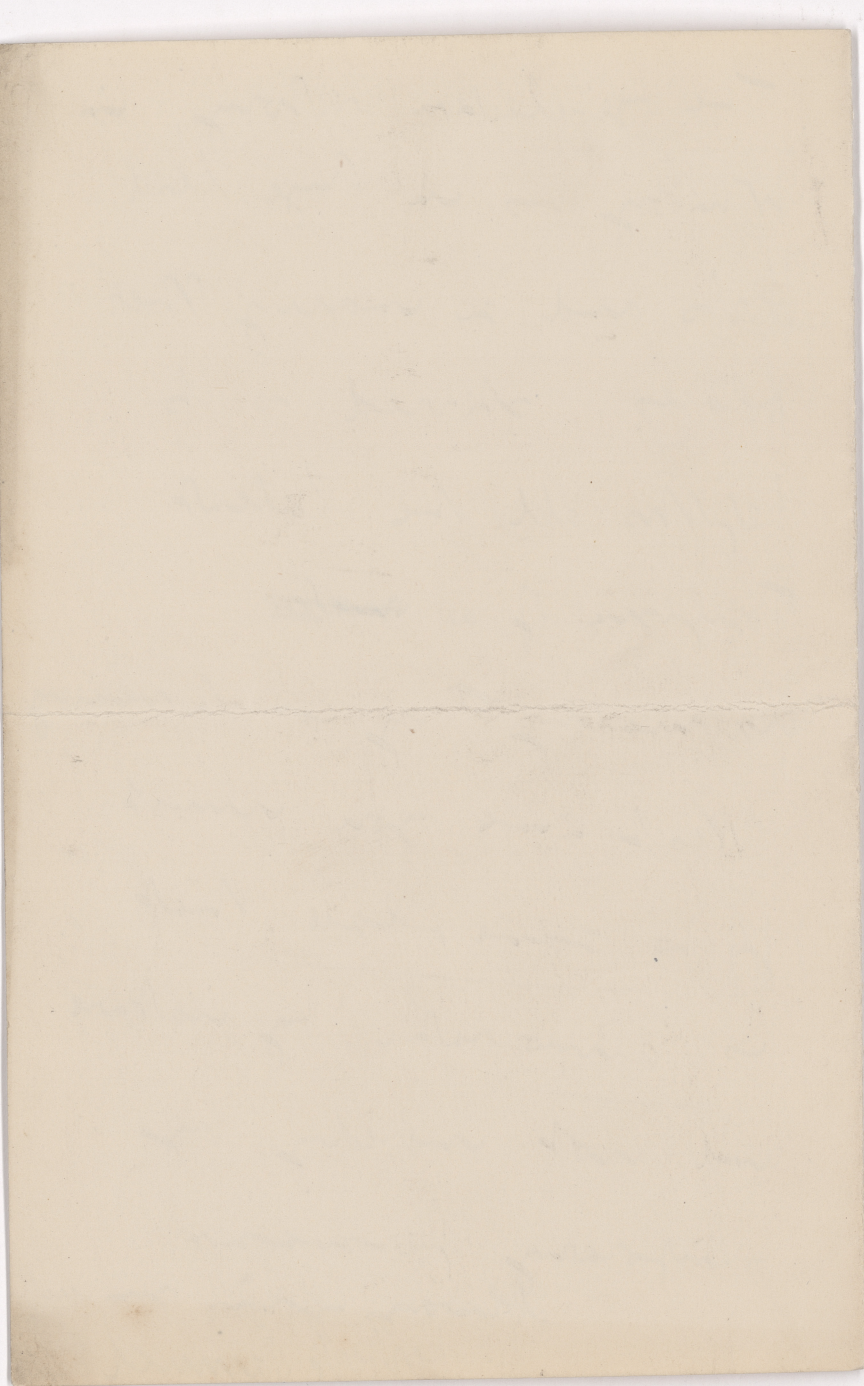

Dear Noel,

I have read with interest your Memorandum about Czechoslovakia. There is much force in what you say. But since you ask my opinion as to possible steps being taken in the House of Lords, I am inclined to say that as the negotiations are proceeding there actively, although perhaps slowly, most members would probably prefer to wait for the outcome than to embark upon a discussion at this moment. It is probable that the Government would only answer that since the two Parties most directly concerned are now negotiating, it is necessary for others to wait to see whether they are able to arrive at a settlement before intervening.
