



I want to tell you about my choice of a title, because I wish to have the approval of my friends as the political aspect seems to me of some importance.

The custom is to take the name of a place, and people suggest the prettiest they can think of. That is alright for those who approve of the institution of titles and see no harm in them, but my view is that they are an undesirable institution, emphasising privilege and giving unfair prestige and distracting attention from real merit. No educated Community would invent such things.

Therefore, when a democrat is appointed to the House of Lords, which legally involves a title, he should try to minimise the harm and bring in reason as far as possible. The Upper House should be regarded like any other Senate for which the use of the title "Senator", as in America, is quite rational. I think that the use of the word "Lord" should be assimilated to the use of the word "Senator". One can contribute to this by using ones personal name as the title.

This also reduces the air of aristocracy. Place names carry more consideration, egg. Lady Cozens-Hardy is a much smaller person in Norfolk than if her father-in-law had called himself Lord Fakenham.

The finst case heard in Norfoll' under the Elementary Education (Blind and Deaf) Chiidren's Act, 1898, came before the magistrates at Nonth Walsham Petty Sessione on Tuusday, when John Andrews, farmer, of Horsey, was summoned by the Norfolk Education: Committee for a proportion of the cost of maintaining his ohildren at the East Anglian Deaf and Dumb School, Gorleston.
Mr. H. C. Davies, the Dleputy Clerk of the Norfoil: County Council, prosecuted on behalf of the Education Committee, and said that the cost of maintaining each child at the Schooi' was $£ 66$ a year which foll on the ratepayers.
