I want to tell you about my choice of a title, because I wish to have the approval of my friends as the political aspect seems to me of some importance.

The custom is to take the name of a place, and people suggest the prettiest they can think of. That is alright for those who approve of the institution of titles and see no harm in them, but my view is that they are an undesirable institution, emphasising privilege and giving unfair prestige and distracting attention from real merit. No educated Community would invent such things.

Therefore, when a democrat is appointed to the House of Lords, which legally involves a title, he should try to minimise the harm and bring in reason as far as possible. The Upper House should be regarded like any other Senate for which the use of the title "Senator", as in America, is quite rational. I think that the use of the word "Lord" should be assimilated to the use of the word "Senator". One can contribute to this by using one's personal name as the title.

This also reduces the air of aristocracy. Place names carry more consideration, e.g. Lady Cozens-Hardy is a much smaller person in Norfolk than if her father-in-law had called himself Lord Fakenham.

I could not be "Buxton" because Sydney objected so we decided on N-B. and with which Sydney approves. The full name is even

more rational than "Buxton" alone because it fully identifies one, which is convenient. If you do not use a place name, the title must be your actual surname (a rule made by King Edward) so I had to make N-B. my surname.

I think it is a lapse that the Labour people have not held out against territorial titles. Lord Sidney Webb would be more democratic and convenient than "Passfield". Even the Heralds College man said he thought I was introducing a useful reform.

Excepting that all loose talk is dangerous it is hardly necessary to refer to Mr. Noel Buxton's latest speech. To talk of a capital levy on all owning over £5,000 is a direct bid for the vote of those who possess less than that sum, and a strong argument against thrifty persons who want to provide for their young children and women folk saving at all. Let everyone spend all he can earn on himself at once and look to the "rates" to keep his dependents in future. Truly a nice selfish doctrine and one which will fail when the rates fail to bring in anything to speak of!

It is satisfactory to see that Mr. E. N. Buxton, the head and real representative of the Buxton family coming forward and publicly repudiating his erratic kinsman, and stating that he has no sympathy with his Bolshevistic tastes or the hired propaganda of the Daily Herald to which he subscribed.
