# LETTER FROM OVERSEAS

NO. 1 CANADIAN GENERAL HOSPITAL, C.A.S.F. (Overseas) c/o Base Army Post Office, Canada. 30th November, 1940.

The Editor, Montreal Standard, Montreal, Quebec, CANADA.

Dear Sir:

Together with covering letter from my Commanding Officer, I enclose pictures of incidents in the life of our Unit, No. 1 Canadian General Hospital, since arriving in England.

The early days, while the hospital site was being selected and made ready, were spent in a Southeastern Garrison Area. Here the Unit was given intensive military and chemical warfare defence training, culminating in a General Inspection by Col. R. M. Luton, M.C., Senior Medical Officer, R.C.A.M.C., England, accompanied by Lieut.-Col. J. C. Mackenzie, (Superintendent on leave of absence from the Montreal General Hospital).

Toward the end of October, the Unit moved to its present hospital site in the suburbs of a Midland Town and were received very cordially by dignitaries and townsfolk. Incidentally, this seems to have been accomplished in record time as in less than three months the Unit had established itself at a hospital site and was prepared to receive patients five days later.

Personnel immediately busied themselves with setting the hospital in order, helped by local organizations, and were provided by the Canadian Red Cross Society with two ambulances, one donated by the City of Calgary and the other by the Capilano Brewing Company, Vancouver, B.C.

In mid November, the continued heavy bombing of a Midland City, and one "incident" in particular, necessitated the evacuation of a number of children's hospitals, and this Hospital Unit was placed at the disposal of the Ministry of Health for this scheme. In spite of the fact that our own nurses had not yet arrived, the Hospital doors were thrown open in the face of this emergency and the first ambulance convoy rolled in.

bulance convoy rolled in. Officers, N.C.O.'s and Men pitched in and assisted by two Nurses loaned from the No. 1 Canadian Neurological Hospital and a few nurses from the evacuated hospitals, took in 150 children. The first convoy was of gift ambulances from the United States to Great, Britain and driven by English lady drivers.

## DR. E.M.EBERTS DIES HERE IN 72ND YEAR

Widely Known Montreal Surgeon on Staff of Montreal General for 40 Years



Was Past Professor of Surgery at McGill University -Funeral from Christ Church Tomorrow

Dr. Edmond Melchior Eberts, C.M., a past professor of surgery C.M., a past professor of surgery at McGill University and a mem-ber of the surgical staff of the Montreal General Hospital for 40 years, died last night after a long illness at his home in Montreal. His age was 71. Dr. Eberts was the son of Her-mann Joseph Eberts and Sarah Mary Gilbert Urguhart. He was born in Chatham, Ont. In June,

1883, his family moved to Winnipeg and in the spring of 1886 they moved to Indian Head, Saskatchewan, where they lived until early in 1887. They then returned to Winning

wan, where they lived until early in 1887. They then returned to Win-nipeg. Dr. Eberts attend high school there and afterward St. John's Col-lege. On May 1, 1888, he was em-ployed at Moosomin by the Can-ada Northwest Land Co. He re-turned to Winnipeg in July, 1889 and in August of that year enter-ed the employ of the Canadian Pa-cific Railway as a clerk in the purchasing department. Barly in 1890 he was transferred to the office of the general super-intendent of the Western Division as a junior clerk. The superinten-dent was William Whyte, who later was knighted. He advanced his position steadily while with the railroad, but in 1893 he decided to study medicine. Early that year he studied for the Manitoba Medical Matriculation that he secured in May that same year. That summer Dr. Eberts was bow oar with the Winnipeg Junior Four and he competed in many impor-tant rowing races. He came to Montreal to enter Mc-Gill University in October, 1893.

The medical course at that time comprised six months during the first, second and fourth and nine months in the third year. For six months during 1895 he was secre-tary to George Drummond of Drummond McCall and Co. By the summer of 1896 he had completed his obstetrical training at the old Montreal Maternity Hospital on St. Urbain street: Urbain street.

Urbain street: Dr. Eberts was graduated fifth in honors from McGill in March, 1897, and on May 1 of that year he en-tered the Montreal General Hospi-tal as an interne. He served as out-door surgeon and in medicine un-der Drs. Molson and H. A. Lafleur. Dr. Lafleur was the inspiration prompting Dr. Eberts to remain in Montreal.

Wontreal, With the assistance of Dr. La-fleur, he went to London to sit for the examination of the Conjoint Board, the passing of which car-ried qualifications which then en-titled a doctor to practise in the Province of Quebec. Dr. Eberts se-cured his M.R.C.S. (England) and his L.R.C.P. (London) in January, 1899. his 1899.

Soon afterward he was offered the position of locum tenens from the leading practioner in Durban, Natal, but he received a cable from Wolferstan Thomas offering him the position of medical superinten-dent at the Montreal General Her dent at the Montreal General Hospital

dent at the Montreal General Hos-pital. Dr. Eberts began his duties in Montreal on May 1, 1899, and con-tinued as medical superintendent until September, 1902. He then set up practise in a Mrs. Bird's lodg-ing house on Dorchester street where Drs. Finley and Birkett had also begun their practises. In the autumn of 1902 Dr. Eberts was appointed Registrar of the Faculty of Medicine. He succeeded Dr. R. F. Ruttan and held that post for one year. Dr. Eberts them mov-ed his practise from the lodging house to quarters in Dr. Pennoyer's house which was at the corner of Dorchester and Mansfield Streets. In the spring of 1903 he took over Dr. Deeks' practise and the lease of a house at 107 Metcalfe street. During the winter of 1902-'03 when he was living with Dr. Pen-noyer, he conducted a coaching class in surgery three nights each week. But important clinical teach-ing at the Montreal General Hos-pital forced him to relinquish these classes. During his career at this hospital

classes

During his career at this hospital Dr. Eberts served consecutively in the following positions:

the following positions: Surgical registrar; surgeon to outpatient department; surgeon from 1914 to 1935; and on the teach-ing staff of the Faculty of Medi-cine through the grades of asst. demonstrator, demonstrator, lec-turer, associate professor, and from 1929 to 1939 as a professor. Dr. Eberts' last office was in the Drummond Medical Building where

Drummond Medical Building where he had moved following the build-ing's completion in May, 1930. He took post-graduate work in London, Vienna, Berne and Bonn and besides contributing to numer-ous medical journals he completed a work on thyroid diseases. He was a former president of the Inter-urban Surgical Society, a member of the Canadian Clinical Surgeons, the American Association for Can-cer Research and a member of the Mount Royal Club and a past-president of the Canadian Club. His pastimes were angling and gardening. In 1904 Dr. Eberts married Beat-rice Muriel Howard of Montreal who died in 1913. He married Grace Lindsay Codd of Waterloo in November, 1919 who died in Feb-ruary, 1940. On September 6, 1941, Dr. E berts married Gertrude Arnoldi of Ottawa. Besides his wife he is survived by three sons: Hermann L. and Edmond H. of Montreal and C. Christopher who is with the Cana-

dian Embassy in Mexico City; two daughters: Mrs. Charles E. Price of Quebec City and Mrs. Charles P. Cooley, jr., of Hartford, Conn.; and 15 grandchildren. A funeral service will be held in Christ- Church Cathedral, tomorrow morning at 11 o'clock. The Dean of Montreal will conduct the service. Burial will be in Mount Royal Cemetery.
