

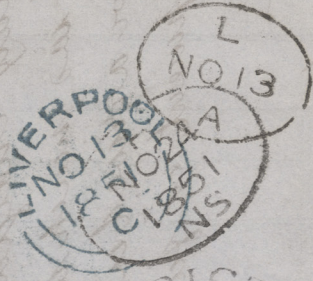
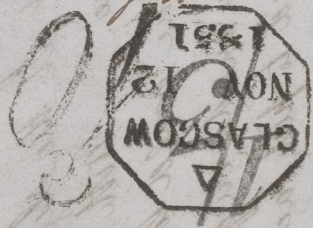

Gentlemen,

Our last was under date 14th Sept, since then we have been favoured with yours of the 26th August, per Mr Cramer; also 8 Thermometers brought by him, which have been placed to your credit. We have now the pleasure of waiting on you with annexed Invoice of 12 Thermometers addressed to you, care of Mr Cramer, at Messrs James & Thomas A'Poob, we hope they will arrive safe & please. We feel sorry at your trouble in this matter.

We have made inquiry about the price of the Bouquet Shapes again, & find that there are a variety of kinds, varying in price from £3 to £1 per lb, according to quality: those sent were of an excellent material & well made. We saw other kinds which looked almost as well & at a much less price, but were informed that they would last but a short time. It is a great pity that we did not get the slightest hint about price from you to have regulated us in our purchase.

With regard to our shipment, per the Bride, our impression was that she would land her goods at Pictou before proceeding to Boston. We have made inquiry at the Agents & are informed that had she not been obliged to put back to port, she would have got into Pictou some time before any of the other vessels that have sailed since ^{from the City} notwithstanding her calling at Boston first. We might by her as we had then no prospect of any vessel for a month or two & even that was uncertain. The Agent says that there will be no duty charged at Boston on your goods, so that the detention which we much regret will be the only drawback. We hope they have arrived in safety & in this & noting your instructions about direct shipment in future with best respects We remain
