Gentlemen

Enclosed please find
Bill of Lading and Permit of
our Collector relative to Two Cases
and 10 Boxes Cigars which we have
taken the liberty of consigning
to you

These Cigars were Consigned to
us by a Jordan House last Autumn
and were entered by us at 4/9 Stg.
per lb but in consequence of the
Market being completely glutted
with that article, we have been
unable to effect a sale, & as in
any case to procure a remunerating
price - the Duties on Cigars in this
place is 30% and we entered them
at too high a valuation

The contents of the two largest
Cases are German Cigars packed in

Boxes of 250 each - the remaining
large Box-Cheroots 12,400 of which
are tied up - the Small Box
contains Cheroots and Cigars in
Bulk - and the Small Box
Broken Cheroots, as we received
them from England -

Our object in exporting them is
to obtain the Drawback - and
you would oblige us by having
them put in your bonded warehouse
and by having the Excise permit
 duly certified by your collector and
returned to us as soon as possible

We have not yet determined
on the manner in which we shall
dispose of them - the Exporters
propose us to close sales and we
must shortly do so for prompt
payment - but whether in or out
of bond we are not decided -

We shall inform you shortly
but in the meantime please
give your opinion of the chances
