

Doston July 2nd 1837

Dear Sir,

Your favor of 13th inst is at hand. I cannot find that there was any error in the account I sent you, or on part, but the Youth Library, should not have been charged by you by Sauborn Carter & Bazin as they advised it here for you, and this they admit. I have paid us today the eight dollars.

Our accounts for papers are kept in a separate set of books & as distinct from all other business though it was another establishment. This may have made some confusion, as you probably kept all accounts together. But after all the only real difference between us in the bill of Nov. 16. 1835 for \$360.

I have before me a letter from you dated "Peterson 8th Nov. 1835" in which you say

" Mr. A. P. Kemp, Dearden,

You will please hand to Sauborn Carter & Bazin for us 6 Copies Ev. Line upon Line, Precept upon Precept & Rep of Day." This package was made up & sent to S. C. & Bazin Nov. 16th, and at the same time we sent you a complete statement of account. The net amount as you will see is \$360

The \$6.00 sent July 7th was received July 16th 1836. \$5.50 was the amount due to balance the paper account

which left '47 in our hands. This we credited on
book account. At that time you owed us 43[¢]. Thus on
the 1st day of January the present year we were all
settled up both our books of papers, with the exception
that we owed you 4 cents. You owed us nothing then;
what you owe us now is for the *Preceptor & Child*
Paper for 1837 - \$ 3.53

Your account was balanced in our
books July 2^d 1835. July 6th & Sept 5th same
year. At this last date there was a balance
in your favor to new account of 3.17
Nov. 16 We charge you 3.60 = 1836 Feby. 16 Credit .47
3.64

Leaving as before stated 4 cents you due, so at this
time the exact amount due is \$3.51.

I believe you will find this correct
as it agrees with our Day Book & Cash Book.

It is our desire to have all errors corrected
to satisfy all enquiries, & however small may be
the amount involved, we think it important to use
all efforts in our power to ascertain the exact
facts in every case.
