The weather has suddenly become quite chilly during the last two days. I only hope I don't run into another "scorcher" when I blow down to Toronto again.

Yesterday and the day before I spent in Sudbury visiting the various mines. The names are rather striking. - The Mond Nickel, Moose Mountain Canadian Copper, Dominion Nickel Copper. These are some of the largest producers of Copper & Nickel in the world. The country for miles around is seared of all vegetation by the sulphur fumes which come from the smelters.

We had a little excitement the day

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before yesterday on account of a wash-out which made it necessary to transfer passengers, mail and baggage from one train to another - the trains standing on each side of the wash spot. Naturally the transfer took a considerable time and we were delayed altogether about 5 hours.

The trains stood still for about  $\frac{3}{4}$  hour and I went back in the woods and picked blueberries - the only one on the whole train to do so and everyone was hungry as we had not then had breakfast. When I laid my Panama under a bush I could strip the berries into it very quickly. They were beauties - great big luscious beggars. I had
