Dear Mr. Winslow: -

Your letter of June 2nd. has just reached me and I can assure you that I was very pleased to hear from you. I am also pleased to hear that business is improving with you folks. I am also in receipt of a letter from Dr. Williams, he tells me that mining in B.C. is improving a little and that he is getting a little business. I am glad to hear it because the chances of getting much business from this concern is pretty slim. Someday probably Dick or myself may see you and explain a few things. Well Mr. Winslow, I arrived here on the 13th of June and am

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feeling fine, it is true that it's warmer
here, but not as warm as I expected
& find it by a long way, in fact, most
of the time since I have been here the
temperature has been just what I like.
I can assure you that I felt the heat
in Montreal much worse during the summer
of 1921 than I have felt it here. Of course,
there are two reasons for it I suppose, viz.

We don't wear as much clothing here, and
what we do wear is very much lighter in weight,
also, we are located right on the water front
and the prevailing winds are from over the
sea, however, I am glad to hear that you
have such nice weather in Montreal and I
sincerely hope that the temperature here won't
rise any higher as long as I remain here,
but I guess that is too much to expect.

Dick Williams arrived here on the
28th June. The Engineers strike in England
have been the means of retarding the work here,

because the locomotives & steam shovels
 were not completed before the strike
 commenced, however I guess they will
 be along some of those warm days, and
 then we will begin the real job we
 came here to do, so up to the present
 I cannot tell you that we have accomplished
 anything worth while blowing about.

There are a plenty of Niggers here of
 both sex but they dont look very attractive
 to me, I believe if I had my choice
 I would prefer the white folks.

Now Mr. Dimmond, you mentioned on your
 letter that you were going to Sherbrooke
 for your Ford car, I suppose you have
 an idea that I am longing to get back
 to Canada in order to have a spin around
 in an auto again, well I cannot tell you
 how many cars there are in Quebec but

There are quite a good number we
 have found, but not Fords, although there
 are lots of Fords running about here,
 also quite a lot of Dodge cars & trucks,
 and many other makes. I was surprised
 after I arrived here to see so many
 cars in use. They even have Joint Policemen
 at the street crossings. Niggers of course,
 but the faithful old horse is unknown
 in this part of the country. Either
 the auto truck or the Nigger's head are the
 beavers of burdens. Anything a Nigger
 has to carry goes on top of his or her head
 whether it be a packet of cigarettes or
 200 lb of pig lead.

Now I think I have said about all
 for this time so will ring off with
 kindest wishes to all the hard folks
 and best wishes to yourself
