Macdonald College
Tuesday, May 4th

The next meeting of the James McGill Society will be held on a pleasant early-summer evening in the congenial setting of Macdonald College. We shall gather in the Student Lounge of the Centennial Centre, where through the efforts of John Andreassen and his staff an interesting Archival Exhibit will be set up, and an appropriate display of books will be provided by the combined resources of the McGill and Macdonald Bookstores and the Faculty of Education.

Two papers will be presented. The first by Howard Stepler will be on the early years of the Faculty of Agriculture, which has played an important role in the development of the 'agro-industry' both in the Province and in Canada as a whole. A member of the Department of Agronomy since 1946 and keenly interested in the history of his Faculty and of his science, Professor Stepler has a rich fund of knowledge and a genial personality which enhances its presentation.

Emeritus Professor Wayne Hall came to Macdonald College in 1949 after a distinguished career in Quebec education to join the McGill School for Teachers. He became Professor in the successor Institute of Education and finally was appointed the first Dean of the Faculty of Education. An excellent speaker with a lively sense of humour, no one is more qualified to speak of the years in which education was located at Macdonald College than he.

By kind courtesy of the Faculty of Agriculture, coffee will follow the presentation of the papers. Macdonald College at Ste. Anne de Bellevue is best reached by car from clearly-marked turn-offs from Route 2 and 20 or from the Trans Canada Highway.
