

Montreal 24 July 1853

My dear Sir

I send you by the Shaw packet which carries them the Siggins fossils. The box containing them is rather too large for them, but that I did not ascertain until too late.

I enclose a list of the specimens referring by means of the numbers on them & the pages of the published section, to the beds from which they come. Some of the numbers I cannot find, and one or two I have lost the place of; but I fancy they all come from the part that you have been examining with Mr Dawson.

If the fossils are of no use to you, they can be sent back

about them either as illustrating  
my section or your own.

The fish scales are sometimes  
obscure & the surfaces well have  
to be narrowly examined for them.

four last reports of progress which  
I believe you have never got

inlaps for microscopic observation for

similar one however is among the  
specimens.
