My dear Dr Dawson

Since I saw you at the Glen on Saturday I have felt very sorry that it was so little in my power to shew you & Mr. D. the attention I would like to do. - Having a party of ministers now staying at my house attending the Congregational Union - I hope this will not prevent you from going again as often as you can make it convenient & agreeable - A much nearer way on foot is to go the length of Dorchester St. and then on what is known as Sissons Lane - The flag staff is a capital guide & you will find it a very short distance - a vehicle can be taken to within a few hundred yards of the Flag Staff - If you could give me a very short account of the results of your examination of the cliffs which you examined - and how far the sand & gravel may be expected to face the clay, which I presume is the bulk of the formation from where we got our clay out last winter -

We hope to take out burnt bricks about Wednesday or Thursday - from the Annular Oven - and after that daily to feed - discharge & burn one compartment - say 22,000 a day (except Sunday) thro' the season -
