My dear Sir,

I am in receipt
of your favour of March 25th
and shall be happy
to give you such information
as may be in my power.

With reference to a
medical education for
your daughter, there is
at present no medical
school in Canada open
to women. In the United
States there are several.
In so far as I know
the best is that attached

to the University of
Michigan

& the University of Michigan
at Ann Arbor, which
is near the eastern side
of that state and within
easy reach of any part
of Ontario or Upper Canada.
I shall try to get a
calendar of Ann Arbor
College and send it
to you.

With regard to your
own settlement in this
country, it is difficult
to advise. The removal
of a large family is
always a formidable matter
and the question of locality

In settlement in a country
no estimate as business
is one twenty my share
consideration. Unless you
have any special place
in view in connection with
any particular line of
business, it would be
best that either you
or one of your sons should
come out beforehand and
explore.

On the whole however
I must suppose
that Canada would
please you better than
the U. States, and Ontario
better than the Province,
as the climate is

in Upper Canada (Ontario)
also could give local in-

If I can give any further
information I shall be glad to do
so; but I am little in the way
of knowing the most eligible places
for settlements. Without good water
your
