My dear Sir,

I have now been here for four days and begin to feel a little return of clarity of mind after the prostration arising from over work in the last few months at Montreal. I have prepared for Peattie a memorandum of what is to be done to keep up the rights he has I hope see this finally transferred to the Montreal Company you know of. In doing so I wished over also the "outside areas" and think it well to write to you now about them. We shall not

be able to get any work
from Lacer upon them
and it may be some
time before it would
be wise to do much.
In the mean time rights
may be expiring. The
following notes may
be of use as to these.

No 137. Suppose one right
on this has expired, and
the second is not out till
May next. It would be well
in the course of this summer
to ascertain if any signs either
of hematite or limonite
are known. If I can come
down I shall go over it. In the
mean time the promising
part is of course that amount
to the red hematite in No 108.

No 113 The right mentioned
on my plan expires July 20

right due this month, it
ought to be taken out of the
