paper when translated  
In this way some  
things might be  
saved. Perhaps how-  
ever they would rather  
have a little more  
time.

that before I got Dallas  
letter I was going to have  
the paper translated here  
and reprinted with  
notes; but I shall I think  
wait now till Dallas  
brings out his translation  
which he says will be  
next month.

Lines reminds me

& Stumalpan to Salvia. This  
was quite an oversight
